Roy London Humanitarian Award

The Roy London Humanitarian Award is presented annually to citizens of Westwood (adults or children) who, by their actions, embody the spirit of Roy London. Roy did many things throughout his life to better the lives of others in the Westwood Community. Candidates for this award are those people who have demonstrated compassionate or charitable action to make Westwood a better community.

The first annual Roy London Award was awarded to three recipients, Robert Folsom, Francis Campion, and Colleen Campion.

Robert Folsom is a life-long resident of Westwood. Bob is well known for many contributions he has made to our community. Like Roy London, Bob is a very dedicated member of his church and a long-term contributor to Westwood's Interfaith Council since its inception in 1982. He has been president of the Rotary Club and he volunteers for Meals on Wheels.

Dr. Francis Campion and his wife Colleen have lived in Westwood since 1998. Dr. Campion is a big supporter

of Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts in Westwood. He has served as Scoutmaster of Troop 3 and has spent many years providing guidance to boys preparing their Eagle projects. In 2007, he received the Donald H. McLellen Award of Leadership in Scouting in Westwood and, in 2008, he

Did You Know . . .

Protect the Environment - Dispose of Button Batteries and Sharps Properly

- *Did you know* that the Westwood Environmental Action Committee is collecting button batteries for the Westwood Board of Health to keep mercury out of the waste stream? Wheelabrator Millbury Inc. sponsors this fundraising program for non-profit organizations in the communities that they serve in cooperation with local boards of health. Wheelabrator will pay up to \$500.00 per calendar year to the Westwood Environmental Action Committee for all types of button batteries. The group has placed collection boxes in all municipal buildings and local retailers. Please save your button batteries from watches, toys, hearing aids, cameras, calculators and the like and deposit them in the boxes or bring them to the Health Department at 50 Carby Street. Let's protect the environment by keeping mercury out of the waste stream. For more information contact the Westwood Health Department at 781-320-1027. �
- Did you know that the Westwood Board of Health has a residential sharps collection program? Residents can dispose of their sharps (syringes, needles and lancets) in the sharps collection kiosks that have been installed outside at the Senior Center, 60 Nahatan Street and at the Islington Fire Station, on Washington Street. The collection units are accessible 24 hours a day 7 days a week for disposal.

Beginning July 1, 2010, residents can no longer dispose of sharps in the residential trash because of an amendment to the Massachusetts Medical Waste Regulations (105 CMR 480.00). The law mandates that all communities comply with removing sharps from the trash stream.

In order to dispose of sharps in the kiosks, you must use a red one-liter sharps disposal container. The Health Department is providing the disposal containers because loose needles are a hazard. Disposal containers may be picked up free of charge at the Westwood Health Department, 50 Carby Street; the Westwood Town Hall, 580 High Street; and the Senior Center, 60 Nahatan Street during regular business hours.



2010 Federal Census Update

- *Did you know* beginning on May 1st through July 31st, Federal Census takers may visit households for those residents that did not return the Federal Census forms by mail, which is vital and required by law (Section 221, of Title 13 of the U.S. Code). All census workers carry official government badges marked with just their name and may be carrying a U.S. Census Bureau bag. The Census taker should never ask to enter your home. If you have any concerns, please contact the Regional Census Center at 617-223-3700 to confirm they are employed by the Census Bureau. ❖
- *Did you know* that a PDF of the Veteran's Park map is on the Town website and that it shows where the bricks are located and can be searched by name? The first page of the Veteran's Park map is a large format map (36" by 36") that is intended for viewing rather than printing. It shows the location of the Veterans' bricks.

There are two additional pages attached to the map that contain a listing of the bricks by the last name (i.e. SMITH, FRED) of the person being honored.

Note: if a brick has more than one name, it is under the single first name listing but the other name(s) are listed there too. This pdf has some additional special features that can only be seen using Acrobat Reader 9. Acrobat



Reader 9 is a free download but needs to be installed before you open the map to use the full functionality. If you are unable to install Acrobat Reader 9 you will still be able to view the map and search for the name on a brick.

If you have Adobe Reader 9 installed, you have the ability to also view the three lines of text on the brick (not the brick itself - we hope to be able to create something in the future that will allow that) as well as a search that will then show you the location of your brick on the map.

New Library News

The Annual Town Election in April gave final project approval for the new main library by a vote of 1,480 to 830.

The next steps will focus on finalizing architectural plans (schematic plans are on the Library website at www.westwoodlibrary.org); writing bid specifications and documents; developing plans to move the Colburn School (sometime in the fall); arranging for project financing through the state grant and a town bond; coordinating meeting and reporting procedures with the Permanent Building Committee; continued fund raising efforts; deciding on interior furnishings and colors; and getting final approval from Town boards.

During this phase, the architects, Finegold, Alexander & Associates, and the project manager firm, Design Technique, Inc., will continue to play an important role along with the Board of Library Trustees and Town employees.

The anticipated ground breaking will be early in 2011. The exact date will be announced later. The library staff will start to formulate plans to provide services during the construction phase when there will be very limited parking at the Main Library. ❖

RAINBOW PROFILES: Celebrating the Cultural Diversity of Westwood

(Rainbow Profiles is a series of articles based on interviews conducted by the Westwood Human Rights Committee with Westwood residents who display the richness and cultural diversity of the Westwood community.)

AN INTERVIEW WITH MARK AND SUSAN ROGERS

While talking with the Rogers, and hearing about the ways their very active lives have been devoted to helping others, it wasn't long before I was repeatedly hearing sentiments like: "It just isn't fair!"; "All people are created equal!"; "So many people need help!" It was easy to see that at the heart of it is their deep sensitivity to social inequality, prejudice, segregation, and the consequences innocent people all too frequently suffer. It brings to mind the inspiration and courage our forefathers had in penning the eternal truth, "All men are created equal." Enjoy reading how Mark and Susan, from their diverse backgrounds, have individually and jointly helped improve and equalize living conditions for others, as told in an interview with Westwood Human Rights Committee member, Marge Griffin.

Meeting Mark and Susan

Mark: Of Middle European ancestry, he was born in Boston into the Jewish faith and raised by parents who were "moderate liberals." After a family move to Newton at age 5, he attended public school there. High school graduation was followed by three years of service in the U.S. Navy. "It was World War 2 and I was on an aircraft carrier. We were in the South Pacific and were involved in some uncomfortable situations." And he explained that in combat, he served as an anti-aircraft gun loader. When not involved with combat, his day job was handling the pay accounts of the crew. Upon discharge, the GI Bill funded his education at UMass Amherst where he majored in Business and Economics which prepared him for a career in the thriving shoe manufacturing business, eventually rising to the position of Vice President of Dexter Shoe. He and Sue met at the New Hampshire home town of Olympic skier, Bode Miller, and are now married 56 years. They lived a short time in Newton before moving to Westwood in 1962 and raising their children here.

Susan: Many of Sue's "free-thinking" Welsh and English ancestors emigrated to Massachusetts Colony in 1624 and 1636, shortly after the arrival of the Pilgrims, settling initially in Dorchester and Hingham. "I'm 13th generation Welsh and 10th generation English," she declared, looking quite at home here in America! Her paternal grandfather (Cushing) owned a mill in Fitchburg which provided a comfortable living for his family, while her grandmother enjoyed a career as a

concert pianist. Their extended family included Boston's beloved Richard Cardinal Cushing. Her father settled his family in an estate area of Fitchburg, and although the Depression brought difficult challenges, he was able to provide private education for her at Northfield School for Girls, a school then known to be rich in diversity which included accepting socially underprivileged students. Her

mother gave food to the needy. Sue later studied at the University of Vermont, Simmons College, and Boston University. Although of Unitarian heritage, she grew to love the Jewish tradition after

meeting Mark, and when they moved to Westwood she joined Temple Beth David with her husband.

Home and Family

It was a tiny house in Newton which they quickly outgrew as their children were born. "We looked at a lot of towns" recalled Mark, "but there was something about Westwood that appealed to us. One of the things was the good school system, and we kind of liked the character and size of the town." Although not a factor in their decision, you'll soon see why it seems almost prophetic that their new-old house was once part of the Underground Railroad, and that when their 4 children grew and left, leaving many rooms vacant, they opened their home as a Bed & Breakfast, offering travelers of every genre a "family feeling" with their lodging.

Influences On the Course of Their Lives

Susan: Reflecting the "free-thinking" spirit of her ancestors, and becoming aware of social injustices, there welled up within her, from a tender age, a deep concern for the conditions people suffered. Elementary school teachers profoundly impressed her with the atrocities war victims experienced – so much so that, at age 10, she wrote a letter of complaint during World War 2 to President Franklin D. Roosevelt for ordering Japanese-Americans (Nisei) to be uprooted and relocated to internment camps. Also aware of the

Town Meeting Brings Westwood Station One Step Closer

Westwood Station Poised to Launch in 2010

As reported back in March, the Commonwealth has agreed to provide \$55M in public infrastructure funding to construct the roadway network at Westwood Station. The specific roadway work includes the I-95S off ramp at Blue Hill Drive, Westwood Station Boulevard and the Canton Street / Dedham Street corridor, down to and including the I-95N off ramp at Dedham Street. Along with the State's funding commitment came several conditions including a requirement to commence at least 400,000 sq. ft. of vertical construction in 2010 and the Town's participation in a \$6M I-cubed financing.



In keeping with the construction condition, the developer has proposed a 450,000 sq. ft. retail center anchored by Target and Wegman's. Joining the anchors are approximately six junior anchors, 15 small boutique type retailers and

a few restaurants. This reduced phase one will be constructed on 35 acres,



leaving the lifestyle center, commercial office complex, free standing condos and the hotels for future development. The newly proposed phase one also required some zoning changes and amendments to the various town issues permits.

At Annual Town Meeting on May 3, 2010, Westwood's residents voted to support I-cubed by a near unanimous margin. Three zoning articles were also endorsed – all by unanimous votes. Once again, Westwood's residents indicated their support for the Westwood Station project. There is a lot of work to be done over the summer to prepare for vertical construction in the fall, but Westwood's staff, boards and public are all up to the task. ❖

Westwood to Have Community Concert Band

Through the generous support of the Westwood **▲** Education Foundation, and support from the Westwood Recreation Department, Westwood will have its own community concert band this summer. The ensemble, called WestwoodWinds, will be made up of amateur musicians who wish to share their common musical interests by joining in preparing for a public performance in Westwood. Any resident of Westwood or its surrounding communities who plays a woodwind, brass or percussion instrument is welcomed to participate with no audition requirement. Performing proficiency should be equal to performing concert band music of easy to moderate difficulty. A repertoire of music including patriotic, TV themes, movie themes, Broadway, marches, light classics and popular music will be performed. WestwoodWinds promises to be a fun experience for participants and a treat to its audience.

WestwoodWinds will be directed by James Giurleo, former Director of Performing Arts of the Westwood Public Schools and Westwood High School Wind Ensemble director. "As a life-long music educator, I

know that the passion for music performance never diminishes after high school." says Giurleo. "WestwoodWinds is an opportunity for some of my former students and other Westwood residents to dust off the instrument they may not have used in a while and rekindle their musical interests. I have sent invitations to every WHS Wind Ensemble graduate since 2006. For them and me, it will be a reunion of former friends who will relive the good times of making and performing music together. For others, it will be an opportunity to meet others with similar interests."

An outdoor concert is scheduled for Wednesday, July 21, 2010 at 6:30 pm. The concert will be held on the lawn immediately outside the WHS auditorium entrance. Rehearsals will be held July 7, 13, 14, and 20 in the WHS Band Room from 7:00–9:00 pm. The concert is included in the Westwood Recreation Department Summer Band Concert series and will be free to the public.

Department of Public Works Transitions

Vicki Vickrey is Named Director of Public Works

The Public Works Department is in the midst of a significant transition. J. Timothy Walsh, who served for the past seventeen years as the first Director of Public Works, retired in March. An extensive search was conducted to select his replacement. Seventy-four applicants were considered. The field was narrowed down to three candidates by a Selection Committee to be considered by the Board of Selectmen. Chris Gallagher, the Assistant Town Engineer, capably served as interim Director of Public Works during this transition period.

Vicki Vickrey was appointed to serve as the next Director of Public Works and officially started her duties on May 26, 2010. Vicki most recently served for the past three years as the Assistant Public Works Director in Ventura, California where she managed a staff of one-hundred eleven and an operating budget of \$40 million. Prior to being promoted to that position in 2007, she had served for six years as the Public Works Division Manager for the City of Ventura, five years as the Water Shed and Water Quality Division Manager and six years

as a Flood Control Administrator for Ventura County. She has a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Texas and serves on the American Public Works Association National Center for Sustainability.

Retirements

John Bertorelli, the Town Engineer for the past five

years (with over thirty-five years of public service) and Ralph Phaneuf, the Highway Superintendent for the past forty-one years, retired on June 1, 2010. The Town is currently engaged in an extensive search for the next Town Engineer and is in the process of considering thirty-five applicants for the position which is hoped to be filled in June. The Highway Superintendent is being filled through the summer, on an interim basis, by John Stanovitch, a Senior Foreman at the Highway Department. The Town will also begin a search for a new Highway Superintendent. •

Holocaust, Sue remembers being angry at my parents, and saying "why didn't you stop that?" And there was a growing awareness of segregation of certain types of people. "My father made remarks about ethnic groups and I would question him about them." Later, while attending Northfield School, the practice of segregated dormitory rooms disturbed her. So, she led a successful campaign to reverse this practice. She wished to have "a community where you could all be friends and not be separated."

Mark: Childhood memories glow with the warm "close family feeling" his grandmothers inspired - the Sunday family dinners and the large annual family Hanukkah parties with presents for everyone. One family member stands out – Uncle Kivie Kaplan – a successful business man in the leather tanning business, and a philanthropist, who devoted himself to human rights causes and especially to the NAACP. He served as its national president from 1966 to 1975. Of him Mark says, "He was the guiding light in the family in this regard," as evidenced by Mark choosing to drink from a water fountain marked "for colored only" while on a business trip in Alabama as a young man, without regard for who might see him. And, yes, he was confronted by a white man about it. Like Sue, an intolerance for injustice had been welling up within him. He sums it up, "It just is not right to allow certain people to enjoy only some rights and not others. God made us all and created us equal."

More On Living Out Their Ideals

Interviewing Sue and Mark about themselves quickly becomes more about how they try to make the world a better place for anyone who needs it. Sue's first action in Westwood, a decisive stand for integration, even before they moved in, was the abrupt dismissal of the realtor when Sue was looking at homes to buy. The realtor said, in prejudiced reference to a certain neighborhood, "You don't want to live here." Of course, the realtor didn't know that Sue and Mark were about to sell their home in Newton to an afro-American family, a remarkable suburban achievement for 1962. And for this, they endured threats and name calling. A movement several years later, to form a Westwood Fair Housing Committee, would find Mark and Sue at the forefront, though it was short-lived in a community not quite ready to adopt the idea. However, another opportunity for supporting integration eventually came to Westwood with the METCO program, again with Sue and Mark holding high the banner. Two of their own children were in the first integrated classrooms. Says Mark, "People don't choose

the color of their skin, it's the way they came into this world!" Says Sue, "So many people need help!"

Laotian boat people, after the Vietnam War, were among those desperately needing help. Sue and Mark took in a family and successfully encouraged members of Temple Beth David to participate. Then there were the Vietnamese orphans of war who occupied a place in Sue's heart, which resulted in her organizing a program at the Pine Hill School (now Hanlon School) for her daughter and classmates to make "sock dolls" to send to the orphans. More recently, Sue has done the same for children in Iraq, through the Westwood Intergenerational Program. Also, they have opened their home to many exchange students from around the world.

Their lists of community contributions are long and varied. Many people recognize Sue from her participation in the League of Women's Voters, her volunteering in special needs classes where she succeeded in starting the program of mainstreaming these students into regular classrooms, her leadership on the Westwood Drug Committee, and her service on the Dedham Suicide Hot Line. Mark was one of the founders of the original Westwood Youth Hockey program, as well as "Umpirein-Chief" of the Westwood Little League, when he wasn't behind the plate himself. He was a long time Trustee of the Dedham Savings Bank and to this day continues to lead his 17-member Westwood Swing Band which plays throughout the area. Also, remembering his brother Joe who was mentally challenged, Mark serves as a board member of Lifeworks, a division of SNCARC (South Norfolk County Association for Retarded Citizens).

Benefits of Diverse Cultures in a Community

Mark and Sue agree that a diverse community helps people to appreciate and accept differences, to accept folks for who they are. And in it's highest sense, they say, "A community that enjoys diversity offers an opportunity to live in a town that follows the words of our forefathers and the Declaration of Independence, namely that we are all created equal under the eyes of God."

How Westwood Could Become More Diverse

Susan: "Registering to vote! The *moment* people move in. The need is to find ways to encourage everyone to vote, to have a voice and active participation. Then they become part of the community."

Mark: "Let's *think* of ourselves as diverse. Wherever there's a sign that says 'Entering Westwood,' there could be another sign that reads, 'A Community Rich in Diversity,' making this a part of the town's symbol." ❖



Dear Westwood Residents,

As I look ahead to the 2010-2011 school year, I am almost certain that the town will be faced with critical financial decisions. That is, how do we continue to pay for the services our residents want



and deserve, with the scarcity of revenue available to fund them? With the state budget seemingly years away from a recovery, towns like Westwood may be forced to fend for themselves. After two straight years of 0% budget increases, your public schools need an infusion of funding. How that happens is a decision that warrants a thoughtful and honest discussion. As a resident of Westwood, I know firsthand that no one, including me, wants to pay higher property taxes.

However, in the absence of new state or local revenue, and with budgets reaching the "tipping point," a Proposition 2½ override may be our only option if we wish to maintain our current service level. I am hopeful that there are better options for us, yet it is also my responsibility to be realistic.

Regardless of what happens next year, you have my commitment that Westwood residents will receive the same high level of communication that has become the hallmark of our school administration. Thurston Students Visit Hale Reservation

With focused enthusiasm, bands of young scientists move through the woods of Hale Reservation. Each student is carrying a field notebook along with a hand lens or binoculars. After a brief orientation, the children begin searching the edges of a fallow

who circulates and talks with students about the process of succession, whereby the field will revert to forest over time. Eight years ago, seventh grade science teacher and on-call field biologist **Mike McCarthy** met with **Jay Walsh** at Hale Reservation to plan a day of outdoor science classes for seventh graders. The resulting

trip has given upwards of 1,600 students first-hand experiences with the stuff they read about in science



textbooks. Children walk up and down glacial deposits and get up-close and personal with the living organisms in a vernal pool. The trip also gives kids the chance to get out and enjoy nature. As McCarthy notes, "Sometimes it is difficult for me to determine whether the enthusiasm and commitment children exhibit...is because students are exercising content

they already know, or whether it is because they are outside."

The fallow field is one of five learning stations set up along a loop trail. A second station is located along the shores of a vernal pool. The third stop is the watershed station, where students build and experiment with a watershed model based on maps developed by continued on next page

Westwood engineer **Chris Gallagher** and **Carly Rocklen** of the Neponset River Watershed Association. At station four, students use stereo-microscopes to observe organisms collected in the vernal pool. The fifth and final stop along the loop brings students to Cat Rock, where they learn about the geological history of the outcrop. Using homemade clinometers and other devices, the students record changes in elevation. Back in the classroom, they'll put those measurements to use by making their own contour maps of Cat Rock. Blue Team student **Patrick Forde** noted that he enjoyed the microscope station the best, because it "gave me a great opportunity to learn about different types of vernal pool critters."

McCarthy's ultimate goal is for students to be able to form "meaningful and personal connections...to their local environment." The proximity and accessibility of Hale Reservation allows them to do just that.
