A Look Back at a Successful Year

As the fiscal year of the Westwood Community Chest (WCC) comes to a close on June 30, we reflect on all that we have accomplished with the help of so many in the community. The year that ends June 2012 can be considered very successful, not only because we have helped many more people with financial awards, extenuating circumstances and

campership grants; but we have also partnered with businesses to raise more funds and increase community awareness of our mission. To top it all off, WCC was honored as one of the three recipients of the Roy London Humanitarian Award. None of this

could have been accomplished without the support of the amazing people and businesses that make up the Westwood community.

Who have we helped?

This past year, WCC granted 63 applicants financial assistance through our confidential temporary assistance program. The organization works with several town organizations such as Youth and Family Services, the Council on Aging, Westwood Public Schools, Westwood Police and other Town Departments to ensure that our community members receive the help that they need. The average award given was \$500 to meet basic needs, such as medical expenses, utility bills, and housing payments. In some cases, \$1,000 was awarded when serious conditions existed.

We have helped neighbors fill oil tanks and pay medical bills. We assisted others when unemployment checks ran out and utility bills piled up. Others asked for help with the mortgage when sickness prevented a primary income earner from working. And we have also helped families with taking care of their children.

Camperships are another important part of the WCC mission. Camp is a treasured part of families' experiences and a child's learning experience. Unfortunately, for some families, when hard times hit, that experience becomes

financially impossible. WCC offers help. Once again this year, we funded more than 35 camperships.

The funding of these financial grants and campership awards comes from donations to our annual appeal and from partnerships with

businesses in the community. This year, our fall annual appeal was quite successful. Additionally, our first "Fill the Chest" campaign with High Street Market and Roche Brothers raised money, but also awareness of the WCC mission. Another local business, Décor & More, held a Holiday Shopping Event fundraiser and, of course, the annual Free Throw Contest and the Westwood Open continued to gather contributions for WCC. In January, "An Evening of International Food & Wine" at Chiara Bistro provided an opportunity to spread our message of temporary financial assistance for Westwood residents in need.

Finally, the WCC's year peaked with the Roy London Humanitarian Award Ceremony. The award is given to people or organizations who have taken action to make Westwood a better community. The Board of WCC is honored to know that WCC's mission is being appreciated and recognized. We are committed to continue the mission of "neighbors helping neighbors" and send a heartfelt *thank you* to all of our Westwood supporters.

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Did You Know...

- *Did You Know* the contractor for the new library project reached a completion mark of 75% on May 15, 2012. Most of the construction activity has moved inside the building. The exterior glass, masonry, and roof work is nearing completion. The parking area will be expanded by 12 spaces on the area where the Colburn School now sits. The plans were approved by the Planning and Zoning Boards.
- *Did You Know* that changes have been made to the Sharps collection program? The sharps collection box that was located at the Senior Center has been relocated to the front of Town Hall. The box at Islington Fire Station remains in place. The sharps collection boxes are available for resident use 24 hours a day, seven days a week to safely dispose of needles, lancets, syringes, and Epi-pens.
 - To properly use the sharps collection box, you must use a red one-liter sharps disposal container which are provided free of charge and can be obtained at the Westwood Health Department, the Senior Center, and at Town Hall during regular business hours. Before placing containers into the collection box, the lid must be taped securely closed. Drop containers one at a time into the collection box. Do not put in paper or plastic bags, or loose needles. We encourage all residents to properly dispose of sharps to keep Westwood safe from the danger of sharps. If you have questions, please call the Westwood Health Department at 781-320-1027.
- Did You Know that Westwood now has a drug collection box? Residents are encouraged to clean out their medicine cabinets and dispose of all unused, expired prescriptions and over the counter medications. You can dispose of your medications in the drug collection box located inside Westwood Police Station; no questions asked. The box is accessible 24 hours a day, seven days a week. PLEASE do not flush your medications because these drugs end up in the groundwater, and do not dispose of your medication in the trash. Take advantage of this opportunity to keep your family and our community safe from harmful drugs. Dispose of personal medications, pet medications, liquids, pills, vitamins and prescription ointments. Don't delay, do it today. If you have questions about the drug collection program, please call the Westwood Health Department at 781-320-1027.

Business In Westwood

After many conversations, meetings, and votes, Westwood residents can now purchase wine and beer from local food stores. Centrally situated High Street Market was awarded the first of three Section 15 licenses in accordance with a Town petition to the Legislature for licensing authority in 2009. Over the last two months, the three food store licenses have been granted to long standing businesses in Town.

High Street Market plans on carrying some selections based on customer suggestions and Roche Brothers will be renovating a section of the store to accommodate their beer and wine inventory. Lamberts will be adding a small wine and beer section to its store which will compliment its food offerings.

The Town has taken a very thoughtful and careful approach to alcohol licensing and given careful consideration to each aspect of alcohol service. Westwood's "Rules and Regulations Governing Alcoholic Beverages" are not only some of the most exacting in the state, but have been utilized extensively by other towns as a template for drafting their own regulations.

With the arrival of Off-Premises licensing, Westwood is helping keep its business community competitive with other towns while serving the convenience of the residents.

All applications must be completed and postmarked by October 15, 2012. Please send completed application to the Westwood Cultural Council, Westwood Town Hall, 580 High Street, Westwood, MA 02090.

The Westwood Cultural Council is part of a grass-roots network of 329 local councils that serve every city and town in the state. The program is the largest, most decentralized one of it's kind in the United States. The state legislature provides an annual appropriation to the Massachusetts Cultural Council which then allocates funds to each local council.

Individuals and organizations may apply for projects such as workshops, lectures, exhibitions, festivals, science education and performing arts projects. PASS funding, which enables schools and youth groups to take students from pre-K to grade 12 to attend cultural performances outside of school, is also available.

Grants are awarded after consideration of the benefit to the community, the qualifications of the individuals and organizations, the planning process, community interest and the population segments served.

Increased Security Measures Shared

Over the past year, Westwood Lodge senior administration has actively collaborated with Westwood public safety, town officials and community representatives to address concerns regarding security at the hospital. Westwood Lodge has undertaken a number of positive actions to minimize the risk of patient elopements. The hospital engaged a security management consulting firm to assess current conditions and identify any additional opportunities to increase security measures at the facility.

As part of both the hospital and consultant's efforts, there was a comprehensive review of practices and procedures to achieve the most effective overall security program. This included a physical survey of the facilities and reviews of security-related policies and procedures.



Westwood Lodge Hospital has completed the installation of its security fencing and improvements to the locking system recommended in the Security Report.

Changes to the physical environment have included new door lock technology, revised patient monitoring protocols, and enhanced staff training. Outdoor fencing was recently installed to provide further security while maintaining access to outdoor spaces for patients. The results of these changes have been very positive as evidenced by the substantial reduction in number of incidents.

The management at Westwood Lodge will continue the collaborative dialogue and planning with all state regulatory agencies, legislators, town public safety and town officials to ensure the safety and security of patients and the community. Westwood Lodge fills a vital role in the community by helping children, adolescents, and adults with mental illness get better through appropriate treatment. Westwood Lodge has been in operation for over 75 years and serves thousand of Massachusetts residents each year with needed care and treatment. The Hospital is accredited by The Joint Commission and fully licensed by the Massachusetts Department of Mental Health.

The hospital remains fully dedicated and committed to its mission of providing the highest quality of care for individuals with special, and sometimes difficult, mental health needs.

Morrison Park Redevelopment Update

Leadership Gifts Propel Project Forward

The Spring 2012 edition of the Community Newsletter described the ongoing work to revitalize Morrison Park. Since then, several developments have occurred that position the Park to become a beautiful center piece of the community for many generations to come. The project represents the successful culmination of a public/private partnership more than two years in the making. The Town will soon realize improvements valued at more than three times the amount of its limited financial investment. Set forth below is a brief summary of the project scope, the enhancement to community tennis made possible by the project, and news of significant leadership gifts made to Westwood Little League recently that will help the vision for the Park become reality.

Project Scope

The basic project scope consists of:

- Construction of a regulation Little League field to replace the current non-conforming field located at Morrison.
- Roofed dugouts to provide children and volunteers protection from the sun
- Upgraded and relocated snack shack to keep children out of the parking lot and to allow volunteer workers to view the game while serving hungry spectators
- Construction of bathroom facilities and the permanent removal of the portable toilet as a fixture in Islington center
- Construction of a small playground area to entertain siblings
- Adjusting the location of home plate and the backstop at the softball field behind Roche Brothers and the possible addition of poles and netting to reduce softballs going onto the train tracks and the Roche Brothers roof
- Creation of open space at the Park, improved landscaping and overall aesthetics, with room for an additional park amenity if desired in the future

Community Support

The support from the community to the news of the Morrison Park revitalization project has been outstanding. At the Annual Little League parade held in April, Little League announced that Roche Brothers and the Roche Family had combined to commit \$100,000 to the project. That significant and extremely generous leadership gift

validated the revitalization vision. At a May 16th public meeting to provide an update on the Project to the community, Little League had more good news: Duncan and Ellen McFarland, who have supported many projects in town, also have chosen to commit \$100,000 to the project. Thus, in a matter of weeks, the Roche and McFarland families, through their exceedingly generous actions, have positioned Westwood Little League for success in completing the project by covering nearly half of the costs Little League expects to incur.

With these leadership gifts in hand, Westwood Little League is reaching out to additional sponsors willing to support the project at any level. Any area business or family interested in making a contribution can do so online by visiting www.westwoodlittleleague.com and clicking on the Revitalize Morrison tab at the top. Contributions from \$25 to \$5,000 can be processed from the site. In addition, any potential contributor can contact any one of the Little League board members listed under the Contacts tab of the website. The League has begun selling bricks on its website and hopes that individuals and families who currently participate or have participated in the past will consider purchasing a brick which can be inscribed and which will be located at the field once constructed. The leadership gifts obtained to date are terrific, but Little League knows that broad community support will be both necessary and appropriate for this community project.

The revitalized Morrison Park will improve the baseball experience in Westwood and also the overall aesthetics of the park. The project is scheduled to commence this summer with the goal of playing ball in the revitalized Morrison Park on Opening Day in 2013.

Not Just Fun in the Sun

Most people in Westwood know that we are fortunate to have the 1,100 acre wonderland known as Hale Reservation as a year-round resource for outdoor enjoyment. And many also know that Hale is home to a very popular summer day camp. But did you know that, as part of its mission, Hale Reservation helps foster diversity in the town?

"We believe that the diversity of the natural environment must be reflected back in the diversity of the people who experience our programs and opportunities for people of any race, background, religion or economic status, "says Eric Arnold, Executive Director. That is a direct quote from Hale's Mission Statement. Each summer over 4,400 children from urban and suburban Boston are given an opportunity to partake in fun and exciting experiences that help them develop a sense of responsibility toward themselves, their community and their environment.

Currently, there are ten agency partners and several generous individuals, foundations and other groups who make it possible for economically challenged children to go to camp. "We are very fortunate to have a wonderful Board of Directors and many incredibly generous area residents and local organizations that recognize the importance of fostering respect for our natural environment," Arnold notes.

Hale Reservation has given generations of children a chance to appreciate the outdoors since its founding in 1918. Through partnerships with the YMCA, Massachusetts General Hospital's Aspire program, Associated Grantmakers Summer Fund, the Bird Street Community Center, the Waltham, Watertown and South Shore Boys and Girls Clubs and the Jewish Community Center of Greater Boston, Hale Reservation's well-trained and enthusiastic staff makes sure that campers have a chance to explore their talents, interests and values while having experiences they will carry with them throughout their lives.

Camp Grossman is the largest day camp and has a permanent site at Hale. The camp offers a caring Jewish environment for children ages 4.5 to 15 years of age. Children from 37 communities experience a wide variety of activities and an informal Jewish education through example, music and special programs. They also offer a unit for

children with special needs. The other camps work closely with Hale's staff to provide enrichment through sports and natural history. Crafts, swimming and boating, ropes courses, nature education and overnight camping are the backdrop for children to see that regardless of skin color, physical ability or economic status, it's wonderful to be outdoors.



2012 John J. Cronin Public Service Award LOUIS RIZOLI

Each year, the John J. Cronin Public Service Award committee awards this high honor to an individual who has served the Town of Westwood. John J. Cronin, Town Treasurer, for many years selflessly gave of his time and expertise for the betterment of the community both as an elected official and in numerous volunteer activities. To recognize this same spirit of community involvement as illustrated by John Cronin's life, the committee has chosen Louis Rizoli as the tenth recipient of the John J. Cronin Public Service Award.

Louis Rizoli has displayed devoted service, dedication and commitment to the Town of Westwood. Through his service on numerous Town boards and organizations, Lou has made valuable contributions to the Westwood community and the Commonwealth.

Lou is a true leader; he has served on several boards and committees in Westwood since the late 1970's.

- Zoning Board of Appeals as an Associate Member in 1978 until 1979 when he became a full member in 1980. Lou remained on the Board of Appeals until 1982.
- In 1987, Lou was appointed to the newly created Housing Partnership as one of the founding members. In 1988, he assisted in the passage of a Home Rule Petition to form the Housing Authority to which he was subsequently elected and served as Chairman until 1998.
- In 1998, Lou was appointed to and subsequently elected to the Board of Assessors and remained on the board for fourteen years where he served as Chairman.

In his private life Lou taught CCD, was the President of the Clapboardtree Nursery School, sits on the Board of Trustees and Bank Audit Committee of Dedham Savings Bank, and is a Lector at the Paulist Center in Boston. Lou is truly a leader and honorable public servant and we are fortunate to have him in the Westwood community.

Frequently Asked Questions

When will the new recycling and trash program begin? Fall 2012.

How will we contain our trash and recycling? Each resident will receive one 64-gallon wheeled cart for trash and one 96-gallon wheeled cart for recycling, where you can combine all your recyclables! You will find the carts very easy to handle! If after trying the cart you need a smaller cart please contact the Westwood Department of Public Works at 781-251-2587.

When will I receive my new trash and recycling carts? The carts will be delivered by Waste Management in the 2-3 weeks prior to implementation.

Will my collection day or frequency change? No. There will be no change in the collection schedule. Please continue to place containers curbside by 7:00 a.m. Trash will be picked up weekly and recycling will be picked up biweekly.

Should I continue to bag my trash? Yes, bagging your trash will help keep the cart clean and sanitary and prevent litter on windy days. All bags must be placed in your cart.

If I have more trash than I can fit in the large cart, what do I do? Experience in a range of communities has shown that the 64-gallon cart is more than adequate for most homes, presuming you remove all paper, plastic, glass and other recyclable materials from your trash. If not, overflow bags will be available for \$3 each at local stores. If after recycling everything possible, you find you

consistently have more trash than the cart will hold, you may request a second cart from Westwood Department of Public Works for \$150 per year.

What if I find I need an extra recycling cart? If after trying the 96-gallon cart you find it to be insufficient, you may contact the Westwood Department of Public Works at 781-251-2587 for an additional recycling cart.

How will I deal with my leaves and yard waste? Leaves and brush will continue to be collected curbside on days specified on Page 2 of your Recycling and Trash Guide or on line.

What if I am moving or cleaning out the garage and have a lot of trash to get rid of? For large projects you will be able to contact Waste Management for information at 800-972-4545. "Bagsters" (Bagster.com or 877-789-2247) provide a cost effective way for residents to deal with large cleanups or moving.
