Westwood Receives AAA Rating

This rating is a wonderful reflection on

Westwood, something all our residents

should take pride in.

As part of a recent bond sale, the Town underwent a credit review by Standard and Poor's (S&P). S&P upgraded the Town's rating to AAA. This is the highest credit rating a municipality can hold and is a great rating for a small community like Westwood. A high credit rating is a statement of a Town's overall fiscal health and can result in lower interest costs on long-term bonds.

S&P stated the high rating reflects the Town's very strong economy, very strong management, strong budgetary flexibility, strong budgetary performance and stable revenue profile, documented financial policies, commencement of commercial

development and strong performance on reserves and liabilities as positive credit factors.

This rating is a wonderful reflection on Westwood, something all our residents should take pride in.

This rating reflects the professional way our residents conduct the business of the Town at the Annual Town Meeting, as well as our residents payment of their tax bills consistently and in a timely manner.

This rating also reflects the great services provided to our community by our School and Town Officials and staff. In particular, our top quality school system not only provides a high quality of life for the community, but also is an important component of maintaining our property values.

The Board of Selectmen has been committed to getting the Town in a strong financial position. The Selectmen have maintained conservative, well-structured operating budgets, and have addressed other areas of financial needs, including the capital budget, reserve accounts, debt level and longterm liabilities.

> The Board of Selectmen appreciates the hard work and assistance contributed by other committees including the Long Range Financial Planning Committee, the OPEB Task Force, the Finance and Warrant Commission, the Planning Board and the Audit Committee, as well as Town

staff and elected Financial Officers including the Town Treasurer, Town Collector, and Board of Assessors.

While the Town will need to remain vigilant with financial matters going forward, this high rating is a great reward for all the hard work done by the community over the last several years.

After receiving the rating, Town Treasurer James Gavin sold a \$2,970,000 bond. The bond is for projects approved at the May 2012 and 2013 Annual Town meetings and will provide for road improvement work, DPW equipment, and Sewer infrastructure improvements. The bond was sold as a 10-year bond issue with the extremely low interest rate of 1.62%. The low rate saves the Town money in debt repayment.

Westwood Building Department

The construction, alternation, or repair of a building or structure requires a permit. *Why should I bother getting a Building Permit?* The simple answer is: not only is it the law, but it ensures your family safety.

Other than the few exceptions listed in the amended 2009 International Residential Code (IRC) and International Building Code (IBC) Section R105.2 and 105.2 respectively, the construction, alteration, or repair of a building or structure requires a permit. Permits are also required for plumbing, electrical, gas and mechanical projects. When a resident is unsure whether a permit is needed or not, a call to the Building Department (781-320-1091) is the best first decision. Beware of contractors who suggest that a permit is not needed. The Building Department will only require a permit if one is needed. Failure to obtain a permit when required, and the failure to obtain all necessary inspection – including a final inspection, can be very costly.

In an effort to elaborate on the importance of proper permitting, a few local permit snafus are illustrated here for educational purposes only.

Seller of a million dollar home lost his buyer because of the discovery that the attic and the basement had been completely finished, including an unpermitted full bath and full kitchen. In addition to losing the sale, permits had to be pulled and much of the work had to be dismantled so inspections of the plumbing and wiring could be completed.

The potential buyer of a new home reviewed the building records on file at the Building Department and found that their potential purchase had a remodeled basement, including a full bath that had been installed without permits. After inspections were conducted, it was discovered that the plumbing and electrical had not been properly installed. Some sections of the project also did not meet building codes. Fortunately, the work needed to bring the property up to code did not stop the transaction, but did significantly delay the sale. The cost of repairs was significant.

A new home owner began substantial renovations without permits. During the renovation process the fireplace was being used to keep the chill out of the house and to dispose of some debris. Unknown to the owner, there was a crack in the chimney flue and the house ignited in the middle of the night sustaining severe damage. Two days after the fire, the insurance appraiser came in to see the property's building records. When he was informed there were no permits, he stated that he didn't think the owner would be able to collect under those circumstances.

A permitted project of an accessory structure was very close to completion but had not yet obtained a final inspection and occupancy certificate. Unfortunately, the structure was destroyed in a fire. The builder attempted to collect on his liability insurance policy but was rejected because of a clause that excluded coverage of accessory structures. The owner attempted to claim the loss through their home owner's policy and was rejected because the occupancy certification had not been issued.

Some other key points to keep in mind

• Permitted projects are not complete without final inspections and sign off. A permit is the cheapest insurance a resident can

Revisions to Cemetery Rules and Regulations Announced

The Department of Public Works and the Cemetery Commission have established revisions to the cemetery rules and regulations, which were approved by the Board of Selectman and implemented February 1, 2014.



The most important and significant changes for lot owners is what is allowed at each gravesite. Safety, aesthetics, and neighboring lots being encroached upon by others were all major factors in having the

necessary revisions accepted. Lot owners are only allowed a planting bed of 18" in front of their upright monument for annuals and perennials. No shrubbery, trees, mounding, borders, mulching or other decorations are allowed, including on the sides or backs of monuments. No personal items such as hats, shepherds hooks, glassware, and stuffed animals are allowed. As the weather gets warmer and families begin to care for lots, the Cemetery Commissions asks that lots conform to these new regulations. The Cemetery Department will begin modifications to non-conforming lots in July 2014.

Introducing Westwood's New Recycling Coordinator

The Department of Public Works has hired Janice
Recycling Coordinator to develop and implement the Town's recycling strategy. Paré will focus on education and providing technical assistance to Town residents, employees, and waste contractors regarding regulations and promotion of the recycling effort. The goal of the position is to reduce Westwood's disposal costs – recycling costs less than trash tipping fees – by educating residents how to waste less, reuse more, and recycle better.

Paré's background is in educational development and environmental health, but her passion for trash and recycling runs deep. While working toward her MPH, she worked with Mass DEP's Bureau of Waste Prevention and has been learning as much as she can about material and waste management ever since. She is active in her community as a member of the Arlington Recycling Committee, and on the Steering Committee of Sustainable Arlington. Most recently, she finished up a two-year public health fellowship at the US EPA, and has been implementing a business recycling initiative in the Town of Hingham.

Paré's duties will include a trash audit to find out how many Westwood residents are participating in bi-weekly recycling. She will be taking pictures of trash barrels and taking notes in order to get a better understanding of how residents use the 2-cart system and overflow bags. This information will help her target areas that need more education in order to increase participation rates over the course of the next 18 months.





Westwood Lodge Presents Mental Health Topics to Local Police

Westwood Lodge staff presented various mental health topics to police officers at their annual training and education series held in March and April. Westwood Lodge was invited to present at the Police Department training program by Chief Jeffrey Silva as a result of discussions held between himself and hospital Chief Executive Officer Gregory Brownstein over the last several months.

Topics covered in the series included "Elements of General Psychiatry," presented by Medical Director Byron Garcia, M.D.; Recognition and Intervention with Suicidal Persons, presented by Gary Jacobson, M.D., Chief Medical Officer; and De-escalation Tools and Strategies, presented by Dwayne Henderson, Interim Facilities Manager and Co-educator for Handle With Care and CPR employee training programs.

In the first presentation, Dr. Garcia discussed major psychiatric conditions including Affective Disorders, Psychosis, Anxiety Disorders, Antisocial Personality Disorder and Addictions Disorders. He addressed their etiology, symptoms and treatment modalities. The session aimed to give police officers "a glimpse into the work we do at Westwood Lodge," Dr. Garcia said. "Being able to recognize some of these conditions may assist in how you help with those you come across in the community." Other topics included suicide recognition and intervention presented by Dr. Jacobson, and verbal de-escalation presented by Mr. Henderson.

After each session, police officers were given the opportunity to ask questions to Westwood Lodge staff, which also included Mr. Brownstein; Lucille Force, Director of Nursing; Katie Adair, Director of Risk Management; and Mihaela Deliu, Manager of Clinical Services. This allowed officers to not only address any questions they had as they connected what they heard during the presentations to their duties in the community, but also to discuss openly their concerns regarding interactions when called to the hospital. Due to its success, Westwood Lodge has been invited back to next year's educational series.

As noted by Police Chief Silva, "I am grateful to Mr. Brownstein and his staff for this training to better help our officers address the mental health needs of our community and the public we deal with. The partnership with Westwood Lodge is an essential ingredient in my quest to provide the highest level of service possible by using industry best practices."

In addition, in recognition of the strengthened community partnership that the hospital has with the Town of Westwood and Police Department, an agreement was signed in January allowing use of the soccer field on the grounds of the hospital. The field has not been used for several years and will now help fill a community need for more recreational space. It is anticipated that the fields will begin being used by the town for community soccer in late Spring or early Summer.

Westwood Lodge is accredited by The Joint Commission and licensed by the Massachusetts Department of Mental Health. The hospital is an 89 bed facility with inpatient and partial hospitalization/intensive outpatient programs for children, adolescents and adults.

CYO Golf Tournament





buy. The Building Department staff is here to protect you and to ensure that your project is completed within the requirements of multiple State Codes.

- A permit is the easiest background check on the quality of a contractors work. A contractor who tells you that no building permits are required is more likely to cut corners and not satisfy all the codes, leaving you with inferior work and the consequences.
- Whether you hire a contractor or you do the work yourself, from it's a small bathroom remodel, an entire kitchen rehab or even an addition, acquiring the proper permits will ensure the work is done right, inspected properly, meets all state codes including building, plumbing, electrical, mechanical and even fire, to ensure the safety of you and your family and all future occupants.
- If proper permits are not pulled, the violation could be subject to triple the fee of what would have been originally charged.

If existing unpermitted work is identified, it is subject to the existing building codes and could cost the owner a substantial amount of money to inspect, replace and/or repair to meet the current codes. For example, an unpermitted bathroom that did not have electrical or plumbing inspections would need to have

sections of the dry wall removed in order to expose the utilities for inspections.

The fact that the unpermitted work is being assessed and taxes are paid does not make your project legal without permits.

In the event of an insurable loss, collection on a homeowner's insurance policy may not be possible if there were no permits or final inspection, and no issued occupancy permit.

Future permits will be delayed until permitted work has been inspected, updated and signed off.

Contractors taking responsibility for someone else's work could charge more than if they were involved from the beginning.

Ask to see the building permit before you hand over a large sum of money to the contractor – both before the project starts and after it is complete. You can always call the Building Department to verify issuance and sign offs.

In a tough real estate market, the last thing you need is to be responsible for the delay of the sale of your home because proper permits were not obtained either by you, or a previous owner.

The Westwood Integrated Preschool functions as an integral part of the educational programs offered by the Westwood Public Schools. The



preschool program provides a high-quality educational experience for three- and four-year-old children with and without disabilities using developmentally appropriate research-based practices. The curriculum is child-centered and adapted to each individual child's

needs following the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) Frameworks and Standards.

The preschool is attached to the high school which has afforded our preschoolers many exceptional experiences. Our collaborative relationships with several high school departments has allowed the preschoolers to attend pep rallies and winter concerts. We have had students from the Robotics Team give robot demonstrations;

students from the TEC class read to the preschoolers; celebrating Dr. Seuss's birthday with high school readers; and visits from Otis, WHS's therapy dog.

This year the preschool teachers have partnered with high school students from the new Early Childhood Education class, taught by Brian Shuman. The high school students are learning theory in their class and then observing, interacting, and applying their knowledge with the preschoolers.

Lunch Prices Increasing

The Westwood Public Schools Food and Nutrition Services is dedicated to advancing our children's health and physical well-being by providing nutritious meals. We follow the USDA guidelines by offering



meals that include whole grain-rich foods, fresh fruits, and vegetables.

Due to the increased food costs over the past five years, as well as new regulations, we will need

to increase lunch prices for next year. The price for milk will be increasing from \$.40 to \$.50 at all schools next year. The Elementary Schools lunch price will remain the same at \$2.75. The Middle

School lunch, now at \$2.75, will increase to \$3.00 next school year. The High School lunch, now at \$3.00, will increase to \$3.25 next school year.

Food Service account balance emails are sent out twice a month and letters are mailed monthly to those who have negative balances. Please remember this is a prepayment system and the state requires us to collect all outstanding balances prior to the end of the school year. We are currently contacting parents/guardians in regard to overdue balances from now until the end of the school year.

In order to maintain the high quality of the program, we need to be assured of payment from student lunches. We are self-supporting and the funds that we collect are used to pay for the operation of Food Service Department.
