Dedham-Westwood Water District was among nine medium to large size Public Water Supply systems to receive the award. Ken Bragg, Chair of the Water District Board, accepted the award during a ceremony held on May 6. Town Meeting Adopts New Stormwater Bylaw

n May 4, 2015 the residents of Westwood voted unanimously to approve a new Stormwater Bylaw which will regulate discharges to the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4). This new bylaw is intended to protect the Town's water bodies and groundwater, to safeguard the public health, safety, welfare, and environment, and to bring Westwood into compliance with mandated federal standards. In addition, the implementation of appropriate stormwater management measures at the site development level will protect taxpayers from the rising costs of managing increased development-related discharges into the MS4, as well as the potential costs associated with restoring waterways degraded by illicit discharges.

From this point on, any development or redevelopment project which includes a land disturbance of more than 5,000 SF but less than ½ acre will require an Administrative Land Disturbance Permit. This will involve the submission of an application and plans for review and approval by the Conservation Agent prior to the issuance of a Building Permit. Where appropriate, the Conservation Agent may grant approval with conditions, including favorable grade changes and other measures designed to prevent erosion and to increase recharge of runoff from impervious surfaces.

Any development or redevelopment project which includes a land disturbance of greater than ½ acre will require a Land

Did You Know...

Westwood Board of Health **Bed bug info**

Did You Know... that bed bugs have made resurgence in the United States? The Westwood Board of Health offers the following information to prevent bed bugs from becoming an unwelcome guest.

Bed bugs are tiny, brown, flat, oval-shaped insects that feed on the blood of humans and may live for weeks without a feeding. They are called bed bugs because they most often live in your bed, but can also be found in upholstered furniture, behind wallpaper and in cracks and crevices.

To avoid bed bugs when traveling:

- Treat the exterior of your luggage with an appropriately labeled insect repellent, before you leave home.
- Place your luggage on a luggage stand, away from beds and upholstered furniture and keep your clothing in your suitcase on the stand
- Avoid bringing personal items, such as pillows and blankets
- Check the mattress and box spring at the corners and edges for spotting, which is a sign of bed bugs

To prevent bringing bedbugs home with you after traveling:

- · Avoid placing luggage on your bed
- Wash and dry clothing before storing

Most people do not have a reaction to bites. If you develop a rash see your physician. "Sleep Tight; Don't Let the Bed Bugs Bite!"

Westwood Public Library Morningstar Research Center Database

*Did You Know...*the Westwood Public Library provides electronic databases, including *Morningstar Investment Research Center — Business and Finance?*

The Library is spotlighting one of its electronic databases: *Morningstar Investment Research Center*. The hope is that you might be interested in trying it out – and possibly tempted to explore the other databases as well. This particular database is available for use by all library patrons on-site at the Main Library. Remote access is limited to Westwood residents with a valid library card.

Find it online at: www.westwoodlibrary.org under the column headed Library Resources. Select Electronic Databases and scroll down the alphabetical list to *Morningstar Investment Research Center*. Imagine, investment research at your fingertips – 24/7.

Morningstar Investment Research Center database can be used to investigate different stock and fund investments. The database is updated daily and provides complete reports for approximately 2,000 funds and 1,000 stocks. Quicktake Reports, which include portfolio, risk, performance, and management information, are available for approximately 13,000 funds and 8,000 stocks. Snapshot information is available for thousands of other funds and stocks. Overall, information for over 100,000 investment offerings is available.

Morningstar, Inc. issues reports twice a month on a five-month schedule. Each fund is rated once every five months. All pricing is current information, and ratings and risk information are updated daily.

Effective July 1, 2015, access to *Morningstar Investment Research Center* will be available for 2 users at any one time. Please select the END SESSION option when you leave your session to allow other users an opportunity to log into the database.

Westwood Public Library **New passes available**

Did You Know...the Westwood Public Library has added several new passes this year? These additional passes are brought to you through the efforts of the Friends of the Westwood Public Library and the generous support of several local groups and businesses.

New to the library this spring are passes to the PawSox, Boston Harbor Islands, the Peabody Essex Museum (Salem, MA), and the Institute for Contemporary Art (Boston, MA)!

The PawSox Pass is sponsored by AAA Southern New England. Pawtucket has served as Boston's Triple-A affiliate since 1973. The Library pass provides a great opportunity to cheer on the Pawtucket Red Sox in a game at McCoy Field, which opened in 1942 and is the oldest ballpark in the International League.

The Library has also added the Boston Harbor Islands Pass, sponsored by the Boston Harbor Island Alliance. This pass became available May 9th. It provides a 2-for-1 discount for ticket purchases (with a *maximum* of 2 free tickets) to the Boston Harbor Islands (Georges Island and Spectacle Island). **This pass is valid for weekdays only!**

Cemetery Expansion

Did You Know...Cemetery expansion funding was approved at Annual Town Meeting? The town is anticipating construction to begin in late summer or early fall. In conjunction with BSC Group and CHS Consulting, the Cemetery Commission is preparing plans and design. The project will provide space for ground burials, as well as alternatives for cremation burials.

When finished, the expansion will provide the town with the following:

Space for 1,900 interments:

- 850 Casket Burials
- 258 Cremation Niches in Wall
- 228 Cremation Niches
- 60 Cremation* lots
- Committal/Assembly Area
- Revised Driveway
- Storm Drainage Improvements
- Fountain in Pond
- New Landscaping
- * Cremation rate will exceed 50% in next 10 years

Single Parent Support Group – A popular summer program that consists of weekly evening meetings Family Services starting at the beginning of July and running through August that offers single parents in Westwood the opportunity to get together and discuss such topics as raising children, time management, finding time for self-care and personal interests, parenting strategies and stress management. Group membership and childcare are provided free of charge, along with pizza and snacks for both kids and parents, thanks in part to sponsorship from the Westwood Early Childhood Council and other local organizations. This group meets on Wednesday evenings from 6:00 – 7:15 pm at the Islington Community Center.

Structured Play Groups - These 8-week groups for kindergarten -5th graders are designed to emphasize the continued development of adaptive social and conflict-resolution skills as well as self-esteem and social confidence. Organized play and drawing activities are used to reinforce weekly topics such as initiating & developing friendships, working cooperatively as a team, appropriate communication, decision-making, as well as appreciating one's own strengths and the differences of others, etc. Groups run throughout the school year and meet from 4:00 - 5:00 pm, one afternoon per week, at either the Islington Community Center or the Martha Jones or Hanlon Extended Day programs.

Girls Only! Groups – These 12-week groups for 4th–6th grade girls focus on navigating friendships and cliques, avoiding peer pressure, managing bullying situations, and improving body image, confidence and self-esteem. We utilize art projects, videos and games to help reinforce these important topics in fun and creative ways! These groups meet one afternoon per week from 4:00 - 5:00 pm in the fall and winter at the Islington Community Center.

Friends Network – The Friends Network program matches 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students in Westwood with high school aged residents in 1:1 same-gender pairs that meet weekly to engage in games and activities in a relaxed setting. This is a great way for children to engage with a positive role model while forming a special friendship and having fun! This program runs from November through April and meets on Wednesday evenings from 6:30 - 7:30 pm at the Senior Center.

Stormwater Bylaw - Continued from page 1

Disturbance Permit issued by the Westwood Conservation Commission. This will require the submission of an application and supporting documentation for review by the Conservation Commission in the course of a public meeting. The Conservation Commission may require Low Impact Development features and implementation of Best Management Practices (BMPs) to achieve favorable stormwater management conditions.

While many smaller developments and redevelopments in Westwood will be unaffected by the new bylaw, others will now require one extra step before a Building Permit can be issued, and property owners will be encouraged to consider BMPs at the project design phase.

The construction of a modest single family home, as described in Table 1, will not require any permit:

Table 1:

30' x50' House	= 1,500± SF
12' x40' Driveway	= 500± SF
30' x 20' Front Yard	= 600± SF
30' x50' Rear Yard	$= 1,500 \pm SF$
30' x10' Side Yards (2)	= 600± SF
Total Disturbed Area	= 4700± SF
<5,000 SF =	= No Permit Required

The construction of a larger single family home with over 5,000 SF of land disturbance will require an Administrative Permit:

Table 2:

40' x50' House	=	2,000± SF
12' x60' Driveway	=	700± SF
50' x30' Front Yard	=	1,500± SF
60' x100' Rear Yard	=	6,000± SF
40' x25' Side Yards (2)	=	2,000± SF
Total Disturbed Area	=	12,200± SF
>5,000 SF but <21,780 SF	=	Administrative Permit Required

Only those projects involving land disturbance exceeding ½ acre of land, and certain development projects with special circumstances (such as projects involving hazardous materials) will require review by the Conservation Commission.


NEW at Westwood Recreation

The Implication of Local Gas Pipelines Projects

Spectra Energy, a Texas company, proposes to build a high pressure gas pipeline, known as the Algonquin West Roxbury Lateral through Westwood, Dedham and West Roxbury. Natural gas (methane) would be pushed at high pressure (750 pounds per square inch) through a pipe 18-24 inches in diameter, buried beneath wetlands, thoroughfares and neighborhoods. Another pipeline is proposed just to our south.

It is important that all of us understand the gas extraction and distribution system and the ramifications of investing in additional infrastructure. The Westwood Environmental Action Committee (WEAC) has been studying this and other pipeline proposals in the area. Among the concerns that our investigation has raised are:

- Methane is an explosive gas. Safety and long term maintenance
 of gas pipelines decline over time, as evidenced by the rupture of
 the NSTAR gas main near University Station in Nov. 2013. The
 gas could not be shut off for six hours, the area had to be
 evacuated, and three fire departments responded.
- Since 2005, gas related accidents in Massachusetts caused 20 injuries including 3 fatalities and cost the general public (not industry) \$8.2 million.
- The industry reports 11,000 leaks per year in Massachusetts and deems 4,000 of them hazardous enough to repair.

- Methane is a potent greenhouse gas and a significant contributor to climate change. Even Spectra Energy admits that it is 25 times as powerful as carbon dioxide. Of the methane extracted, 3-7% is released unburned at drilling and fracking wells, compressor stations, and throughout the aging delivery system.
- In addition to methane, significant quantities of toxic chemicals, including formaldehyde and other VOCs, are pushed into the ground and the air at fracking sites and compressor stations.
- Investing in new gas infrastructure will prolong our dependence on this carbon intense fuel and divert resources from developing renewable, non-carbon-based power sources such as wind and solar
- Since the proposed pipeline is intended to convert oil heat systems in Boston through its old, leaky distribution system, and not feed the electric grid, it will not reduce our electric bills.
 Rather, the multibillion dollar cost of these projects will likely be recovered by raising our electric bills.

If you would like to learn more about this and other nearby gas pipeline proposals, please come to the Gas Pipeline Forum, hosted by WEAC and the Westwood-Walpole League of Women Voters on Wednesday, June 24th at the Westwood Public Library from 7-9 pm A panel of experts from all sides of the issue, including representatives of Spectra Energy, have been invited.
