A True Community Effort

Westwood Community Group Makes a Real Difference for Residents In Need

In the summer of 2014, Dottie Powers, the Westwood Town Clerk, discovered that a homeless family was living at the Budget Inn on Route 1. Powers recalled, "I received a birth certificate with an address at the Budget Inn and called the new father. He confirmed they were living there and disclosed some of the unmet needs with which they were dealing, such as not having transportation to well visits for their newborn. I spoke to Mike [Jaillet, Town Administrator], and said we need to help them out." At that time, as now, there were several temporary shelter sites established in hotels and motels across the state in an effort to assist the homeless population. With the school year approaching, the town administration learned from the school department, who were informed by the state, that there were in fact seventeen families residing at the Budget Inn.

Knowing these families were in need of resources and support, Westwood Town Administrator, Michael Jaillet, acted fast. He contacted Danielle Sutton, Director of the town's Youth & Family Services Department, asking her to take the lead on forming a group that would pull together any and all Westwood residents, leaders, groups and municipal workers to offer humanitarian support for these new Westwood residents. Jaillet said, "Danielle was right there, ready to go and take this on. She received a similar response from everyone she invited to participate. After a few meetings, people were asking to be included."

Formally known as the Transitional Assistance Group, they met for two hours each month for the next twenty months to discuss

the needs of the residents, current resources, and new protocols that could be created to best support this isolated population. Avi Glaser, Westwood resident, and group member said, "I was honored and proud to be a part of a group that assisted the homeless families in Westwood and helped to make their temporary stay a little easier." Some of the other group members who graciously volunteered time and resources were: Representative Paul McMurtry; Dottie Powers, Westwood Town Clerk; Abby Hanscom, Director of Student Services for Westwood Public Schools; Linda Shea, Health Director of Westwood Board of Health; Sergeant Paul Sicard, Westwood Police Department; Trish Tucke, Westwood Food Pantry; Harry and Ula Patel, owners of the Budget Inn; Kathy Ford, Abundant Table in Norwood; Janet Lucey, Westwood Early Childhood Council; Reverend Chris Dodge, First Parish Church; Deborah Shields, Department of Community and Housing Development (DCHD); Marissa Marlowe, Director of the Department of Public Health's F.O.R. Families Program; Moira Wilcox and Jonathan McCurdy, F.O.R. Families Caseworkers; Gretchen Golz, Clinical Coordinator, Department of Public Health's F.O.R. Families Program; Rev. Dr. Stephanie A. Salinas, First Baptist Church of Westwood; Rev. Dr. Jennifer M. Phillips, St. John's Episcopal Church of Westwood; and Connie Rizzoli, Westwood resident, Westwood Disability Commission, and Project Bread representative. "As time went on, different entities in the area that were assisting folks with basic living needs offered to incorporate these families into their envelope of services," said

Town Planner Earth Work Permitting Reminder

Did You Know...Property owners considering significant earth work related to new construction, or regrading to obtain a more level yard, should be aware that they may need prior approval from the Planning Board. If the grade changes will require more than 200 cubic yards of soil, gravel, rock or other material to be moved onto or off of your property, then a

special permit must first be obtained from the Planning Board. This special permit requirement is explained in Section 7.1 of Westwood's Zoning Bylaw http://www.townhall.westwood.ma.us.

Section 7.1 was adopted to provide an opportunity for review of the transportation of earth material and the effects on the neighborhood. To learn more about filing requirements and possible exemptions, please contact the Planning Office at 781.251.2581 or the Building Department at 781.320.1090.

Health Department

Prevention of Substance Abuse grant

The Town of Westwood in conjunction with the Towns of Needham, Norwood and Dedham has been awarded a multi-year state grant for the prevention of underage drinking and other drug use through their respective Health Departments. The \$300,000 Substance Abuse Prevention Collaborative (SAPC) grant was awarded by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's Bureau of Substance Abuse Services (BSAS) includes renewal options that could extend the three year funding commitment to a seven year commitment, for a total funding of \$700,000.

The four communities have formed a Regional Leadership Team, which includes representatives from Public Health, Fire, Police, Schools, Town Government, Substance Abuse Coalitions, Youth and Family Services, faith-based organizations, and interested residents and organizations from each community. The Community's existing Westwood Cares Committee members serve as our representatives. Each community is in the process of conducting on-line parent surveys to gather data on underlying problem and causes of underage drinking and drug use.

The grant fits in nicely with the ongoing efforts of the Westwood Cares Committee, formed by Westwood Youth & Family Services, to provide information and resources to the families of Westwood, regarding substance use and abuse, and related issues. Westwood Cares works towards the healthy and safe development of our youth, providing assistance and information to families seeking such support. The organization consists of a wide range of representatives from the community, including parents, students, educators, and municipal and school officials and staff.

The group is conducting community assessments as part of a strategic planning process to address youth alcohol and drug use. The assessment involves reviewing youth survey data; conducting key stakeholder interviews with community leaders, key stakeholders, and residents of all ages; and holding listening sessions with parents and youth. So far, the collaborative and its consultants have determined that the four communities are quite similar in several ways and different in others. The staff and community representatives are in the process of identifying areas that are most concerning to each community and options to address these areas in each.

Several resources were already available in Westwood for residents in need such as Westwood Community Chest, Summer Camp Scholarships, the Westwood Food Pantry, counseling services and more. However, given the isolated location of the Budget Inn, and lack of transportation among this population, those helpful resources could not easily be accessed. The most pressing need was food. Sutton and the group worked to implement a routine in which Budget Inn residents could fill out a form, much like a grocery list, on a Tuesday, and receive food from the Food Pantry by Thursday of the same week. The middle steps, including picking up the forms from the Budget Inn, bringing them to the Food Pantry, filing the food requests, and finally transporting the groceries back to the Budget Inn, were all coordinated and facilitated by volunteers. Not only did group members step up to support this effort, but students were recruited from Westwood High School's Transition Program, to find, sort, and bag the groceries at the food pantry. This saved time for other group members, and also provided an important and meaningful job for these high school students. Tucke shared, "From the food pantry, to the high school students, all of the volunteers that brought donations, it was truly a community effort."

To say that the community came together for this cause is an understatement. In addition to the regular Transitional Assistance Group members, there were numerous other residents, groups and businesses that gave money, time and resources to best support these residents in need. Though there are too many to mention here, some exemplary instances include the following.

Abundant Table in Norwood delivered healthy dinners to residents at the Budget Inn each Wednesday and Friday evening, along with Holiday meals at Thanksgiving and Christmas. The owner of Papa John's in Norwood and Westwood resident,

Michael Krone, established a weekly pizza delivery to families in need at the Budget Inn at no cost for either the food or the delivery. Westwood Eye Care & Optical donated eye exams and glasses for those children in need.

The Westwood Public Schools went above and beyond for the school-aged children and families in their care, creating a lending library for children in the lobby of the Budget Inn, coordinating social and educational opportunities through the Extended Day program and various summer camps, and connecting students and families to local resources as needed. Hale Reservation offered free summer camp to all age-eligible children in the summer of 2015 and Laura Mac and her team at Dedham Savings Bank donated funds for transportation between the Budget Inn and Hale Reservation. The Westwood Rotary Club and Westwood Youth & Family Services both coordinated gifts during the holiday seasons for the children residing at the Budget Inn. Thanks to donations from individual Westwood residents, the Transitional Assistance Group was able to begin a taxi voucher program through Veteran's Taxi and White Cab/Norwood Taxi, providing much needed rides for these families to schools, appointments, job interviews, bus and MBTA lines. Finally, local parishioners from several faith groups donated money to assist with the many needs of this homeless population.

When it was announced this winter that the state would be phasing out their emergency shelter program at the Budget Inn in Westwood, as well as in ten other hotels across the Commonwealth, the Transitional Assistance group evolved their efforts to support families as they moved into more permanent housing. Local faith groups and individuals offered household items and the Westwood Community Chest provided new mattresses so that families would be able to start out in their new homes.

Jaillet has said many times that this is what Westwood is all about – stepping up to help each other in times of need. Jaillet felt so strongly about the amazing work this group and the town had accomplished, that he nominated the Transitional Assistance Group for a Roy London Humanitarian Award (RLHA) in March 2016. The RLHA honors late Westwood resident, Roy London, who volunteered in many ways to selflessly make his community a better, kinder place. The RLHA Committee agreed with the important work the Transitional Assistance group did, and has chosen the group as one of the three 2016 award recipients. Jaillet reflected, "I knew Roy London personally. Roy London would not only have been proud of what this group accomplished, he would have been sitting there with us each month."

Islington Center Update

The Unique Village-Style of Islington Center Undergoing Exciting Happenings







Islington Center Task Force requests your feedback

Many exciting things are happening in Islington Center! From the rehabilitation of Morrison Park, to the construction of the new Islington Fire Station and the design of the East Street Bridge replacement, this treasured section of Westwood has seen a lot of recent attention. In addition to these ongoing public improvements, a private development project proposed by Supreme Development was granted a special permit from the Westwood Planning Board. That special permit will allow Supreme Development to renovate the Islington Pizza/Wild Blossom building and to construct a new mixed-use building next door, with two commercial storefronts and 12 one-bedroom apartments above.

Along with the potential for great change comes the desire for careful guidance. Toward this end, the Westwood Board of Selectmen formed the Islington Center Task Force (ICTF) to spearhead a well-coordinated, proactive approach to redevelopment. The task force is comprised of representatives from various Town boards and committees, Islington residents, business owners, and Town staff. This dedicated group has been meeting monthly since November 2015, and will continue to meet over the next two or three years to review and discuss all issues affecting Islington Center. The ICTF will focus its attention on Washington Street between Fairview Street and Clapboardtree Street, on School Street between Washington Street and Schaefer Avenue, and on East Street between Washington Street and the East Street Bridge. The task force will identify the most significant character-defining elements of Islington Center, consider obstacles and opportunities for improved pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular circulation, and encourage building, site, and infrastructure improvements appropriate to this area's unique village style of development. The ICTF will consider all aspects of Islington Center and make recommendations to the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen as either board considers decisions affecting Islington Center.

The ICTF recently issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to explore options for the potential redevelopment and/or reuse of various town-owned properties along Washington Street. That RFP invites interested parties to submit creative proposals for possible uses of various town-owned properties, including the Municipal Parking Lot, Wentworth Hall and the Islington Community Center. Interested bidders can obtain RFP documents by signing up on the

town's Procurement webpage. Bidders will be required to demonstrate the financial capacity to move forward with their proposal, and must meet other requirements, such as compensation for community space presently associated with these properties, including the Islington Branch Library, Youth & Family Services offices, and several Recreation programs. Bidders are also encouraged to provide a home for the MMO Nursery School, which has operated in Islington for more than 40 years.

The Islington Center RFP is intentionally open-ended to encourage creative responses. It does not obligate the town to sell or lease any of these properties, and requires an exhaustive public process before a sale or lease could even be considered. That public process will involve the open review and competitive analysis of proposals by the ICTF and by the Board of Selectmen. If any proposals warrant further pursuit, the Board of Selectmen may negotiate a disposition agreement with selected bidders. If a proposal reaches this point, its developer will be directed to apply for all necessary approvals, and to follow the normal permitting process with the Planning Board and all other relevant boards and commissions. If the required permitting approvals are eventually granted for a project requiring a property transfer, residents will then have an opportunity to decide at Town Meeting whether or not to authorize the Board of Selectmen to proceed with the proposed transfer. Active public participation will be encouraged at every stage of the review process, so that residents truly have a say in the future of Islington Center.

In addition to inviting creative proposals through the RFP process, the ICTF has also prepared a survey to solicit information from residents about their ideas for Islington Center. This survey is intended to obtain information about how Islington Center is viewed today, and to gather opinions about how this area might be improved. The task force would like to hear your thoughts about Islington Center—its present, past, and future. Please take 15 minutes out of your day to share your ideas and help the task force better understand your thoughts and desires for this prominent village center.

On November 7, 1991, Pamela Murray was introduced to the Board of Selectmen as the best candidate for the newly created part-time position of Budget Analyst. Dog Licensing Deadline for 2016 was March 31, 2016

Failure to license your dog on or before March 31, 2016 will result in a fine of \$25.00, per town bylaws §184-10,B.(1)

You may license your dog by mail, provided you include a copy of a current rabies certificate and a self-addressed stamped envelope. If you are licensing your dog for the first time, proof of spay or neutering is also required.

Licenses will be valid from January 1, 2016 until December 31, 2016.

You must license your dog on an annual basis.

If you own more than 4 dogs this is considered a "Personal Kennel" per MGL c. 140 §136A.

You must go through a special permit application process through the Zoning Board of Appeals to license a kennel.

Licensing Fees are as follows:

Dogs not Neutered or Spayed: \$15.00 Dogs Neutered or Spayed: \$10.00

Kennel fees-please contact the Town Clerk's office.

Please be sure to include the correct licensing fee. If you are unsure, please contact the Town Clerk's office at 781.326.3964.

The **Annual Town Census** was sent to each household in December, If you have not returned it, you will be receiving a second one shortly; failure to return the Census may cause a voter to be designated as inactive on the voting list (M.G.L, Ch.51, § 4).

For the past quarter of a century, The Foundation for Westwood Education (formerly known as Westwood Educational

Foundation or WEF) has been raising money we then use to award grants to community groups, teachers, and schools that submit proposals for innovative and meaningful educational and cultural enrichment programs. By



providing a source of funding not otherwise available, the Foundation supports high-quality education for our schools and the community at large. This year, the Foundation is celebrating not only its 25th year, but also the anniversary of having invested more than \$1 million in the Westwood community.



Capital Needs Study Public Forum

Public Forum was
held on May 11,
2016 at the Thurston
Middle School. The
purpose of this
forum was to lay out
proposed

plans to bring the Westwood

Public School buildings at the elementary level up to code, as well as to address building and educational inefficiencies among the five schools. The overall goal of creating a sustainable, affordable educational model was put forth at the forum after two years of building study and educational assessment by the architectural firm Symmes Maini & McKee Associates.


All in all, there were ten different options presented, broken out into four categories. The first category was "The Status Quo" which essentially brings all existing buildings up to code but does not address any educational needs.

The second category of options involves keeping all five elementary schools and building additions to better address the educational needs of the system. In these options the buildings would be first brought up to code as with "Status Quo" and then would be added onto.

The third and fourth categories of options involve consolidation of buildings that would result in one or two buildings being closed. These options address

building deficiencies as well as educational needs, and result in a more streamlined, efficient, and sustainable educational model for the school system.

Thank you to all those residents who came out to voice their opinions. There will be many more opportunities for residents to help in the process of selecting the best option for the Westwood Public Schools. As Superintendent John Antonucci has said, "We have to address our aging infrastructure and create the best educational model that is possible for Westwood. Doing nothing is not an option."

Transportation rates will not increase for the 2016-2017 school year. The annual bus fee will be \$180 per student, with a family cap of \$450 for all students in Grades K-12.

Bus stickers will not be issued to middle and high school students. At the end of August, parents should check the Aspen Portal to see what bus # their child(ren) have been assigned. Bus routes will be posted on the district website and in the local newspaper.

To guarantee a seat on the bus, registration and payment must be received by the June 30th deadline

Eagle Scout Service Project:

Nicholas A. Fusco, a resident and boy scout from Troop 1 in Islington, approached Town officials inquiring about an Eagle Scout project he was planning that would benefit the Town of Westwood. We have fully supported his project.

This project entails replacing the current handicap parking signage at Westwood public schools, athletic fields and all municipal buildings with a new Accessible icon. Pavement signage will be repainted and the metal handicap signs will be replaced.

According to Nicholas, "the current handicap icon depicts disabled people as immobile and depending on others for mobility. The icon does not accurately reflect today's active populations of people with disabilities. The new icon features a person in a wheelchair moving under their own power."

For years, handicap parking spaces have been labeled with an icon of a motionless person confined to a wheelchair. Awareness has increased and movements are underway to replace the handicap icon with one that symbolizes a more active handicapped community.

Nicholas got the idea for his project through the "Accessible Icon Project" which is an ongoing work of design activism. It starts with a graphic icon, free for use in the public domain, and continues its work as collaboration among people with disabilities and their allies toward a more accessible world.

Nicholas will be reaching out to family, friends and fellow scouts to assist him with this project. He plans to provide training prior to implementation of these new signs.

The cost of the project is approximately \$2000.00. He has contacted local groups such as the Rotary Club of Westwood and Dedham Savings bank who have agreed to make a donation to this wonderful project that will benefit the Town and the people of Westwood with disabilities.
