Westwood First Responders

Advice and helpful resources from concerned town officials

Despite the best efforts of legislators, members of law enforcement, first responders, clergy and family members, the national epidemic of opiate abuse continues—even in Westwood. The Fire and Police Departments as well as far too many families and friends, have seen the tragic results of drug addiction which can result in seizures and death.

The Westwood Fire and Police Department personnel carry the reversal drug Naloxone, also known as Narcan. They have carried it for well over 10 years. Each member of the department is trained in its use. The medication has been administered hundreds of times and saved countless lives.

If you suspect that someone has overdosed, call 911 immediately so medical attention can be promptly administered.

If you suspect a friend or a loved one is suffering from addiction, we encourage you to continue to seek professional help. The Governor has made this issue a priority and there are more professional resources being made available at the local, county and state level.

If you are interested in learning where to obtain Narcan and how to use it today, call Dispatch at 781-320-1000 and ask to speak with one of the paramedics about Narcan information and education and we will assist you. Your questions will be addressed immediately and confidentially.

You can get Narcan from a pharmacy, with or without a prescription, under a standing order made available through the Department of Public Health (DPH). CVS and Walgreens pharmacies participate in the program. Please call or visit your local pharmacy for more information. An up-to-date, state-wide list can be viewed on-line at:

Westwood Board of Health FLU CLINIC Save the Date!

*Did You Know...*The Westwood Board of Health will be holding the Annual Flu Clinic on Saturday, October 15, 2016 from 9:00 AM-12:00 PM at the Westwood High School gymnasium?

This family flu clinic is open to all Westwood residents 5 years of age and older. Residents under the age of 18 years must be accompanied by an adult. Vaccine is administered on a first come first served basis. There is no cost to residents for the vaccine but we do ask that you bring your insurance or Medicare card with you so that we may bill your health insurance. We will be accepting monetary donations for the Westwood Food Pantry. Hope to see you and your family at the flu clinic! Mosquitos

Did You Know... that mosquito populations are active into the fall? The Westwood Board of Health would like to remind residents to take action to avoid mosquito bites and reduce mosquito populations. The risk of contracting **Eastern equine encephalitis** (EEE) and West Nile Virus (WNV) from an infected mosquito is heightened through early October. Mosquitoes can carry disease until the first hard frost.

EEE is a rare disease with serious life threatening symptoms. Symptoms are high fever, stiff neck, headache and lack of energy followed by inflammation and swelling of the brain (encephalitis). There is no treatment, few people fully recover from the illness and 50% do not survive.

WNV usually causes mild or no illness in humans. In rare cases, it can cause encephalitis (swelling of the brain) or meningitis (swelling of the lining of the brain and spinal cord). Less than 1% of people infected with WNV develop serious illness. At the present time there is no preventable vaccine.

To avoid mosquitoes please consider the following:

- Limit your time outdoors during peak periods of mosquito activity (dusk and dawn) or if you must remain outdoors, wear a long-sleeved shirt, long pants and socks.
- Use a mosquito repellent that contains DEET (the chemical N-N-diethyl-meta-toluamide) and follow the directions on the label.
- Take special care to cover up the arms and legs of children playing outdoors. When you bring a baby outdoors, cover the baby's carriage or playpen with mosquito netting.
- Fix holes in your screens and make sure they are tight-fitting on all doors and windows.
- Remove standing water around your home. Make sure water does not collect and stagnate in ceramic pots, trash cans, recycling containers, old tires, wading pools, birds baths, etc. Remove leaves and debris that may prevent drainage of roof gutters.

Westwood Board of Health Asbestos Regulations Revised

Did You Know...The Westwood Health Department would like to inform residents that the Asbestos Regulation (310 CMR 7.15) has been revised and now requires that an asbestos survey be conducted by a MA Licensed Asbestos Inspector prior to renovation/demolition activities.

In June of 2014, the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection revised the Asbestos Regulations, including a clarification that all renovations and demolitions require an asbestos survey prior to site work. Specifically, owners/operators need to determine all asbestos containing materials at the site that will be impacted by the proposed work prior to conducting any renovation or demolition activity. Except as exempted pursuant to 310 CMR 7.15(4), (Owner-occupied, single family residence involving asbestos abatement of solely non-friable Asbestos Containing Material), an asbestos survey is required regardless of the age of the building.

At a minimum, a Pre-Demolition/ Pre-Renovation Checklist must be completed and submitted by the Permit Applicant prior to receiving a Building Permit.

All Commercial Properties and all residential properties conducting partial/total demolition activities must submit this survey to the Health Department for review prior to receiving a demolition permit.

Alerts Before Concord Tornado Allowed Residents to Take Shelter

RAMINGHAM, MA – The Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) encourages all residents of the Commonwealth to use their cellphones to receive emergency alerts and warnings about imminent severe weather and other threatening situations. The morning of August 22, many residents of the Concord, Massachusetts neighborhood that was hit by a tornado were awoken fifteen minutes before the tornado hit by emergency alerting systems on their cellphones. The advance warning allowed those residents to move to safety within their homes before the tornado hit.

Using the emergency alerting capabilities of your cellphone to be informed during emergencies is an important component of emergency preparedness. Every family should have multiple methods for receiving emergency alerts, including at least one with an audible alert to wake you in the middle of the night.

"The tornado that struck Concord in the overnight hours on August 22nd while residents were sleeping was a reminder of the importance of receiving emergency alerts," said Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency Director Kurt Schwartz. "Residents in the tornado warning area received alerts through the Wireless Emergency Alerts system on their cellphones. Additionally, alerts were sent to cellular devices loaded with MEMA's free Massachusetts Alerts app. These warnings allowed residents to take shelter before the tornado struck."

Voting and Election Updates

As a result of the recent Election reform bill he following changes have been made:

Early Voting

- Beginning with the November 8, 2016 State Election, Massachusetts will be allowing all registered voters to cast early ballots in biennial state elections.
- All registered voters will be eligible
- Voting will take place at a designated early voting location to be determined.
- Early voting will begin Monday October 24, 2016 through 11:59 a.m., Friday, November 4, 2016.

Pre-Voter Registration

- Effective August 1, 2016, 16- and 17-year-olds are eligible to pre-register to vote.
- Applicants may pre-register to vote in person (at the office of the Town Clerk), by mail (using a mail-in pre-registration form), through the Commonwealth's online voter registration system (www.sec.state.ma.us/ovr/), and at the Registry of Motor Vehicles.
- Once the pre-registrant has attainted the age of eligibility (18 years old) they will be registered as a voter and an acknowledgement notice will be sent.



Proactive Approach, Expanded Participation of Community sought towards Islington Center Improvements

Islington Center Update

Islington Center has seen a lot of attention lately, including the recent rehabilitation of Morrison Park, the construction of the new Islington Fire Station, and the pending design of the East Street Bridge replacement. In addition to these ongoing public improvements, a private

development project proposed by Petruzziello Properties was granted a special permit from the Westwood Planning Board. That special permit will allow Petruzziello Properties to renovate the Islington Pizza/Wild Blossom building and to construct a new mixed-use building next door, with two commercial storefronts and 12 one-bedroom apartments.

Last September, the Board of Selectmen formed the Islington Center Task Force (ICTF) to spearhead a well-coordinated, proactive approach to redevelopment of this highly visible section of Westwood. The task force is comprised of representatives from various Town boards and committees, Islington residents, business owners, and Town staff. This dedicated group has been meeting monthly since November 2015, and will continue to meet over the next two or three years to review and discuss all issues affecting Islington Center. Islington Center Task Force meetings provide an expanded opportunity for active public participation in detailed discussions about potential improvements and redevelopment opportunities.

The task force will identify the most significant character-defining elements of Islington Center, consider obstacles and opportunities for improved pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular circulation, and encourage building, site, and infrastructure improvements appropriate to this area's village style of development. The ICTF will consider all aspects of Islington Center and make recommendations to the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen as either board considers decisions affecting Islington Center.

Creative input from residents and board members would be expected to further shape the details of any redevelopment plan.

As one of its first endeavors, the task force developed the Islington Center Survey to solicit input from residents about their current experiences with Islington Center and their desires for the future of this treasured part of town. The online survey

questions were designed to obtain information about how Islington Center is viewed today, and to gather opinions about how this area might be improved. Survey respondents were encouraged to weigh in on the desirability of specified commercial uses, from apparel and sporting good stores to pharmacies and veterinary offices. They were also asked to explain what aspects of Islington Center could be improved and to note any characteristics they wished to see remain.

The survey was announced in the June edition of the *Westwood Community Newsletter* delivered quarterly to all Westwood addresses, and was scheduled to run through June 30th. It was also discussed in several ICTF, Planning Board and Board of Selectmen meetings, and was covered in an article and weekly announcements by the Westwood Press. A link to the online survey was posted in a prominent location on the town's webpage, and printed copies of the survey were made available at both libraries, the Westwood Senior Center, the Town Clerk's Office and the Office of Community & Economic Development. In response to continuing interest, the survey link was kept open active through July 27th. As of closing, a total of 667 responses had been received. For the sake of comparison, that number is equivalent to more than 13% of Westwood households.

The Islington Center Survey was not designed to obtain statistically significant data, but rather to allow for the collation of residents' thoughts and ideas about character-defining elements and potential redevelopment opportunities in Islington Center. The survey was offered to provide another mechanism for public participation in decisions affecting the future of Islington Center, by capturing the opinions of residents who might not have the time

or inclination to attend public meetings. Participants were given an opportunity to express themselves through multiple open-ended responses. The survey results indicate strong feelings about current community uses and facilities, including the Islington Branch Library, Morrison Park, the School Street Playground, and the Mothers Morning Out (MMO) Nursery School. Some appreciate the existing architecture, while others feel that there is significant room for improvement. Many note the need for traffic and pedestrian/bicycle safety improvements. The survey results also indicate a strong desire for additional food service establishments, including restaurants, coffee shops, ice cream/vogurt parlors, delis, and specialty food shops. In addition to the online survey, the ICTF recently issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to explore options for the potential redevelopment and/or reuse of various town-owned properties along Washington Street. That RFP invited interested parties to submit creative proposals for possible uses of various town-owned properties, including the Municipal Parking Lot, Wentworth Hall and the Islington Community Center. The town received one response to that RFP from Petruzziello Properties-the same developer who recently received a special permit for a mixed-use development in Islington Center. The Petruzziello Proposal calls for a mix of commercial, residential, and community uses in new and restored buildings.

The Petruzziello Proposal responds to the RFP with a concept level design for the town's consideration. If that concept is found to be both appealing and feasible, more detailed plans would be developed for further review. Creative input from residents and board members would be

expected to further shape the details of any redevelopment plan.

The initial concept proposal calls for the relocation of Wentworth Hall – home of the Islington Branch Library – to the site of the current CVS building. It proposes the construction of a full basement under the relocated Wentworth Hall to increase library programming space, and adds a 10,000 sq. ft. addition to the rear of Wentworth Hall to house a new MMO nursery school with a community center above. This proposal also calls for the construction of a mixed-use building on the northwest corner of Washington Street and School Street, where the Café Diva building and the municipal parking lot are today. That new building would be designed to include approximately 9,000 sq. ft. of commercial space on the first floor and up to 28 one-bedroom apartments on the second and third floors. The Petruzziello Proposal would construct a new 12,000 sq. ft. CVS building on the northeast corner

of Washington Street and East Street where the Islington Community Center now stands. Finally, that proposal would relocate the historic Blue Hart Tayern to the rear of the former Westwood Tailor Shop parcel at 9 School Street, and would restore that building before turning it over to the town for office or community use.

In addition to the ICTF's online survey and RFP, the Department of Community & Economic Development recently held an Islington Center Visioning Session to give

residents yet another opportunity to express their thoughts on the future of Islington Center. That session, which took place in the Westwood recommendations to the Planning Board and High School cafeteria on July 26 and Board of Selectmen as either board considers was attended by more than 60 residents, involved small group discussions of

potential redevelopment plans for the municipal and privately owned parcels involved in the Petruzziello proposal. Each group then presented its suggestions to the larger audience. Most suggestions involved a mix of community and commercial uses, while some included new residential uses and additional public open space. The Visioning Session was recorded by Westwood Community Access Television (WestCAT) for local viewing. ICTF members and members of the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board will be able to watch the WestCAT video to gain additional perspectives on residents' varied desires for the future of Islington Center.

The ICTF will meet next on Thursday, September 8th at 7:00 pm in the Islington Community Center to begin its review of the Petruzziello Proposal. The ICTF will meet again on Wednesday, September 15th, at a location to be determined, to hear a formal presentation by the proponent. Members of the

public are encouraged to attend both sessions and to share their opinions with the task force.

The ICTF will consider the Petruzziello proposal in light of the sentiments expressed by residents at the task force meetings, respondents to the Islington Center Survey, and attendees of the recent Islington Center Visioning Session. The ICTF will then send a recommendation on the merits of the Petruzziello proposal to the Board of Selectmen when that Board considers the proposal later this fall. If the Board determines that the proposal warrants further pursuit, it may negotiate a disposition agreement with the proponent. Following the endorsement of such an agreement, the proponent would then be directed to apply for all necessary approvals, and to follow the normal permitting process with the Planning Board and all other relevant boards and commissions. If the required permitting approvals are eventually granted for a project requiring a property transfer, residents will have an opportunity to decide at Town Meeting whether or not to authorize the Board of Selectmen to proceed with the proposed transfer.

On June 16, 2007, the School Street Playground re-opened after a year and a half of fundraising by members of the Westwood Young Women's Club and other town departments, local businesses and private donors. What does it say that almost 10 years later the playground is Numero Uno on a popular Moms Blog? It speaks volumes of the dedication of individuals and town departments to our town, our children and our community.

DPW Director, Todd Korchin, was very happy to bring this article to our attention. Pride in his staff, specifically Jimmy McCarthy, Harry Mikortarian, and Brendan Ryan, for maintaining the playground and securing safety certifications were the first things he wanted to share. "They deserve kudos on this one!!!"

Online research brought me to a Wicked Local post from June, 2007 (westwood.wickedlocal.com/x1479661766). The article highlighted the efforts of a community who came together to rejuvenate the playground after the original wood structures had seen better days. Town Administrator, Mike Jaillet remarks, "The town hasn't forgotten those efforts and still wants to thank the Westwood Young Women's Club for conducting the fundraising and management of this community asset when it was constructed years ago. It came at a time when the town could not afford to do

For the second time, Westwood awarded grant as a Green Community

Michael Jaillet, Town Administrator for Westwood announced on June 28 that Westwood was awarded a second competitive energy efficiency grant by the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources (DOER). Three years ago, Westwood became a Green Community. Since becoming a Green Community, the Town has applied twice for grants to fund energy efficiency efforts in the Town and has twice been awarded a grant.

Background

Tom Philbin, the Westwood Energy Manager, and Patricia Healey, a DPW Administrative Assistant, filed for a Green Communities Grant in March 2016 for \$210,000. The proposed projects covered in the grant included a new control system at the Downey School and conversion of lighting to LEDs at Downey School, Martha Jones School, and at the Senior Center.

Tom Philbin and James McCarthy, the Town Facilities Manager, attended the award ceremony in Auburn on June 28, where the 2016 awards were announced. Westwood received 100 percent of its application amount which is an indication of the high quality of the proposed projects and the completeness of the application. This is due in great part to the fact that Westwood's Energy Manager, Tom Philbin has a longstanding and a broad level of expertise in energy conservation. His effort was complimented by Patricia Healey's hard work, dedication, and efficiency in preparing the application and assembling monthly energy usage data from all departments.

In addition to Green Community funding, Westwood will receive incentives from Eversource. Westwood works with Eversource in their Municipal program and receives help by way of financial incentives and project cost control through the use of pre-approved contractors. The Eversource Municipal program has proved to be a great benefit to towns in Massachusetts over the past ten years.

"We're thrilled that Westwood has once again succeeded in securing a Green Communities Grant in recognition of their hard work to make the town more sustainable and energy efficient," said Penni Conner, Senior Vice President and Chief Customer Officer at Eversource. "We share the town's commitment in our own buildings, including at our Westwood offices where we've been awarded prestigious LEED Existing Building and Energy Star certifications.

It should be noted that part of the money committed to pay for Tom Philbin's services came to Westwood in the form of an earlier grant from DOER. Once these new improvements which are funded by this new grant are made, the Town will see an ongoing annual reduction in its energy costs which are directly attributed to the projects covered by this grant.

The Town is expected to sign a contract with the Commonwealth on how the grant funds will be expended. The Town will be required to report back to the state on the progress of the projects in order to receive full reimbursement.

As a Green Community, under Tom Philbin's direction, Westwood is committed to continue to reduce its energy consumption by 20% over a five year period. These newly funded projects, as well as others completed in past years and others that are being planned for the future, will contribute to the achievement of this goal. Additionally, the Town has committed to design enhancements at the proposed new Fire Station and Police Station which will make these facilities 30% more energy efficient than required by current building codes.

The IAM Strong Foundation, which seeks to shatter the stigma surrounding teen mental health issues, is pleased to announce the beginning of its Fall grant cycle.

Grant applicants must be non-profit organizations or affiliated individuals who share a vision that aligns with the values and mission of the IAM Strong Foundation.

The IAM Strong Foundation began in January of 2015 and since its inception has made great strides in opening the conversation about adolescent mental health. Last fall, the IAM Strong Foundation presented "An Evening With Kevin Breel" in Norwood, where the nationally acclaimed comedian and mental health activist spoke to a full house, and a panel provided a thoughtful and honest discussion about mental health. Last winter, the organization sponsored "Messages For Hope," where people of all ages gathered at the Westwood Senior Center to compose uplifting messages for teens that struggle with mental health issues. Hundreds of uplifting cards were created.

The very first grant cycle for the IAM Strong Foundation was held in the fall of 2015, and grant cycles have continued twice a year since then. 
