#### John Cronin Public Service Award

The John Cronin Public ■ Service Award Committee was honored to present James J. Gavin as the 2017 Recipient. Jim has served on numerous boards and committees in Town providing financial guidance throughout his tenure. From 1997 through 2008, Jim served on the Finance and Warrant Commission, the Permanent Building Committee and was elected as Town Treasurer in 2003. After winning the election, Jim worked with the staff to issue the \$45 million bond for the High School, the largest bond issued by Westwood. In 2012, lead the financial team through a process called refunding meaning refinancing the remaining balance of the High School bond saving the Town \$2.7 million in interest.

Over the last 15 years, Jim, serving as Treasurer, has issued over \$95 million in bonds for various school and municipal projects and capital investments. His knowledge, expertise and understanding of municipal bonds repeatedly secure bonds at the lowest interest and terms in the best interest for the Town. In 2014, the Town's credit rating was upgraded to an AAA rating, the highest a community can receive. Jim's leadership and guidance over the years was a significant contribution to the Town achieving this. Jim has and continues to oversee the Treasurer's Office and its staff working closely with the Finance Director to ensure all the key functions and duties are carried out and automated to best serve the community and its residents.

Jim has also served as the Town Treasurer on the Aid to the Elderly and Infirmed, Long Range Financial Planning Committee, OPEB Liability Task Force, Budget Steering Committee and as the Custodian Tax Title Representation.

A lifelong resident of Westwood, Jim and his wife Diane of 31 years have raised four children, Katelyn, Jimmy, Kevin and Danny and is the grandfather of Keagan Shaw. He has also been a coach of Youth Hockey, Soccer, Baseball and Pop Warner Football. He currently serves on the Board of Directors of Rockland Trust/Peoples Federal Charitable Foundation.

## Did You Know...

#### Aid to the Elderly and Disabled Tax Fund

*Did You Know...* that the Town has an Aid to the Elderly and Disabled Tax Fund?

- The Fund was established by Town Meeting in 1999 to provide real estate tax relief assistance to qualifying, low income Westwood elderly and disabled residents.
- Over the years, the Fund has assisted many long-time Westwood residents who wish to remain in the Town and homes they love.
- Since its inception, the Fund has provided assistance to a number of these qualified residents by directly paying a portion of their tax bill.
- In FY17, the fund distributed \$56,000, approximately the same as FY16.
  - Approximately 39 residents received a payment ranging from \$800-\$1,500. The typical recipient in FY17 was 88 years old; had lived in Westwood for over 60 years; and lived in a home valued at approximately \$425,000.

If you, or a fellow resident may be helped by the fund, applications are available at the Tax Collector's office at Town Hall, the Senior Center on Nahatan Street, the Library, and is downloadable from the town website at www.townhall.westwood. ma.us/.

#### Interactive Kiosk Unveiled at High School

**Did You Know...** that on May 17, 2017, the Town of Westwood and Ameresco, Inc., (NYSE:AMRC), a leading energy efficiency and renewable energy company, co-hosted a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony to unveil a new interactive kiosk located in the lobby at Westwood High School. The kiosk serves as an informational tool and educational display in support of the Town's sustainability efforts. The interactive kiosk displays the environmental benefit of solar, and provides information about the Town's solar arrays at the Westwood High School, Thurston Middle School, and the Martha Jones and Downey Elementary Schools.

"We're excited the solar arrays at the schools are complete and are operational and that the kiosk, donated by Ameresco, has been installed," said Thomas Philbin, Energy Manager, Town of Westwood. "Ameresco's technical expertise and experience has afforded us a valuable partner in helping Westwood to drive our energy strategy forward. In addition, the kiosk will provide our students and the community with an informational tool that helps to further enhance the learning environment."

Ameresco designed, built, owns and will operate the four roof-top renewable energy arrays. The multi-million dollar, renewable energy project includes approximately 1,800 panels installed on the roofs of the schools, creating energy savings for the Town of upwards of \$2 million over the 20-year term of the Power Purchase Agreement (PPA). The PPA provides purchase of the

# Westwood Council on Aging Celebrating 50 years!

**Did You Know...** the Westwood Council on Aging, established in 1967, will be celebrating its 50th year this summer! So much has happened and so much has changed!

A little background: In 1965 the Medicare program was approved which was a new concept to help those over 60 with their health insurance. With this in mind, Massachusetts created an Executive Office of Elder Affairs to help with understanding its aging population and then created "Councils on Aging".

In Westwood, Richard Hart, along with Winifred Hubert, John Farrell, Anne Slocomb and Edith Phillips created a committee and planned an afternoon party at the Pine Hill School. The local paper said that 60 seniors enjoyed a "Get Acquainted Program."

The Council grew and by 1967 over 100 seniors had signed up to be members at a cost of \$1 annually. From the beginning, the Council was aware that there were three primary needs: a Center to house programs, transportation for those who no longer drove, and a way to distribute information for anyone over 60. Housing also became a huge issue as Westwood's affluence and taxes soared.

In the late 90s, Pat Larkin, then Director of the COA, began to put together a combination of state and local funding as well as grants and donations from numerous individuals and foundations and built the Westwood Senior Center. It was later renamed the Patricia Carty Larkin Senior Center. Over 1200 seniors use it regularly and that number continues to grow.

As Westwood's population continued to grow, so did the needs of its aging population. Today the Center hosts programs that help anyone 60 or older stay healthy, stay connected and age well. At 50 years, the Westwood Council on Aging hosts over 30 regular programs (from Art to Zumba), travels near and far, offers a five day transportation initiative as well as outreach services that assist Westwood seniors with food security, housing information and referral services.

Massachusetts Senior Centers (Council on Aging) around the Commonwealth are vital institutions for any 60 plus citizen; moreover the Westwood COA is proud of its tradition, its significance and its many accomplishments.

generated electricity at a fixed rate that is lower than it currently pays to Eversource, resulting in annual utility budget savings.

#### #endthestigma

There is something that we as a community, as humanity, can do to assist in alleviating the opiate epidemic. First, understand that no one chooses to become addicted. Addiction, also referred to as substance use disorder, is a chronic disease, much like high blood pressure and diabetes. Like high blood pressure and diabetes, addiction can be successfully treated.

Second, addiction is not the result of a person's moral failings nor is it a lack of willpower. Addiction causes physical changes to the brain's circuitry, resulting in cravings and destructive behaviors. Using derogatory terms such as "junkie" and "degenerate" only serve to deepen the stigma associated with the disease of addiction. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), stigma results in prejudice, avoidance, rejection, and discrimination against people who have a socially undesirable trait or engage in culturally marginalized behaviors, such as drug use (Link, 2001). The stigma of addiction also afflicts the family and friends and discourages them from seeking help for their loved one.

Effective ways for individuals to help reduce stigma include:

- Offering compassionate support
- Listening while withholding judgment
- Seeing a person for who they are, not what substances they use
- Treating people with substance dependency with dignity, respect and compassion
- Avoiding hurtful labels
- Sharing your own stories of stigma (Villa, 2017)

As this article was being written, emergency crews successfully resuscitated another individual suffering from an opiate overdose in our community. This is the third opiate overdose in the last several weeks. If you or a loved one is suffering from substance abuse, please reach out for help. You can contact the Town of Westwood's Youth and Family Services department at 781-320-1006.

**B** oard members of the Foundation for Westwood Education voted, at their May 10, 2017 meeting, to fund J-term, a pilot program at Westwood High School. Scheduled to take

place after the final exam period in 2018, J-term is a five-day experiential learning program designed for freshmen, sophomores and juniors. J-term courses will differ substantially from those traditionally taught at the high school and will allow students the opportunity to delve deeply into an area of current interest or explore a new interest during an immersive learning experience of their own choice. Proposed J-term courses range from the very practical, such as "Basic Carpentry and Wiring," to the more esoteric, such as "Exploring the Development of Truth from Socrates to Snapchat."

the spiritual needs of the families who seek the resources of the agency. He is also a part of the Rasin Foundation which is dedicated to collaborating with the people of Leogane, Haiti to improve the physical and mental health of the community and assist in economic and technology development. Although he was happy to contribute his medical expertise in treating people, he knows that his true impact will come in empowering the local care givers, almost all nurses and nurse assistants, to provide that health care themselves.

Hannah Paterson is a Senior at Westwood High School and will be attending Georgia Institute of Technology majoring in biochemistry next year. She is a member of the varsity swim and dive team, and the Ultimate Frisbee team. She also belongs to the Spanish Club and made the honor roll every term for the last four years. During the summer, Hannah

works as a lifeguard and swim instructor and really enjoys being outside on adventures. For the past three years, Hannah has gone on month long trips with a group of 20 teenagers and 5 leaders backpacking, white water rafting, climbing, biking and kayaking in the Mountains in North Carolina, Washington, Oregon and Alaska. Hannah was just invited back to Washington and Oregon this summer to attend a leadership course so she can be one of the leaders of similar groups in the future. Hannah was nominated for the RLHA for volunteering since she was a freshman with St. John's Church Youth Group at the Church of the Holy Spirit in Mattapan. It didn't take too long before Hannah realized that the center there was lacking in children's books, so Hannah brought in her childhood books. When she exhausted her collection, she began buying books with her own money at second hand bookstores and local neighborhood sales. She soon realized that books that included people of color helped instill self-esteem in the children at the center so she began to look specifically for those kinds of books. When St. John's heard about what Hannah was doing, they began sending books to the center with Hannah. Soon, she was able to fill the shelves with all kinds of books for the children to read. But Hannah didn't stop there. She realized that most of the children didn't have books at home. So, she began a lending library in the name of a fellow tutor that had recently passed away. Hannah is now collecting enough books so that the children can keep them for themselves at their homes.

Pam and Peter Kane are founding members of the Westwood Environmental Action Committee (WEAC) and are very hands-on workers at all of the electronic recycling days each year. Pete has long been a proponent of renewable energy and energy conservation, including spearheading the adoption of the Stretch Energy Code for the Town of Westwood. Peter also led the way for Westwood to become a Green Community, making available upwards of \$1 million in grants. Over the years, the Kane's have opened their home to tours of their zero net home for others to learn and explore ways to conserve energy. Some of the first solar panels in Westwood are from Peter's efforts. As a former member of the Finance and Warrant Commission, Peter actively advocated for new energy efficient buildings in Town. As members of the First Parish Church in Westwood, Pam and Peter helped with the energy efficient addition to the existing building. Peter obtained his teaching certification and is now teaching science at Norfolk Aggie where he created courses in environmental

science and climate change and is spearheading a proposal to place new solar panels on the roofs. Pam is also an active member in the community including still serving on WEAC and with the League of Woman Voters. She managed the brick program for the entrance at the High School and is now doing the same at the First Parish Church. Pam and Peter together have hosted four exchange students who have attended Westwood High School. Pam takes each student to Washington, D.C. to see the sights and continues to keep in touch with all of them. After the death of a friend, Peter and Pam welcomed his overwhelmed wife from Vietnam into their home and taught her how to cope with day to day issues. Because of their help she is now living at their home.

The IAM Strong Foundation was created in February of 2015, after the passing of Isabelle Medina, a Westwood adolescent who took her life. In creating the organization, friends and family sought to open the conversation about adolescent mental health and to shatter the stigma around mental health struggles. The title of the organization, "IAM Strong" honors Isabelle, as "I.A.M." are her initials. In the early days of the organization, the IAM Strong Foundation's presence on social media platforms was met with overwhelming support from the Westwood community as well as neighboring towns and cities, across the country, and across the globe. Their first 5K fundraising event, which took place at Westwood High School just three months after the organization began, drew over 700 participants. Since that time, IAM Strong has continued to grow and become a significant and positive presence in the mental health arena, funding almost \$100,000 in grants and programming to date. IAM Strong grants have brought mental health speakers to schools, provided critical training to school personnel, provided mental health services for teens, supported programs for coping skills for teens in the classroom, as well as funded many other initiatives. In addition to providing much needed grants, the IAM Strong Foundation sponsors an event each year entitled Messages of Hope, where community members of all ages gather at the Senior Center to create homemade cards for teens who are receiving inpatient treatment. The organization also sponsors a free event for the community each year featuring nationally known speakers, with a goal to support and educate the community around mental health. All of outreach and grant programs were created with an important goal— to shatter the stigma of mental health struggles and to continue to open the conversation about adolescent mental health.



#### **Quality of Service Survey**

The Town appreciates the 1.181 responses from 22% of the households to the Quality of Service Survey included in this year's census.

The survey asked residents about familiar general government, finance, public safety, human services, public works, recreation, seniors and community, and economic development services. Residents who returned the survey, ranked the level of satisfaction and commented on improvements that could be made to the services.

For the most part, the scores were in the favorable range for all services, most especially for public safety, youth and family and senior services, where the comments often cited the professionalism and helpfulness of the staff.

The survey included many comments and suggestions for improvement. For example, there were several mentions for expanded, more frequent leaf pick up that extend later in the fall and for consideration of acquiring or engaging a vacuum truck, the value and ease of early voting, and the desire for more adult recreation programming. All of the comments and suggestions received will be considered going forward.

Again we would like to sincerely thank everyone who took the time to complete and send in the survey. We will do everything in our power to make it catalyst a for improving the services municipal government provides.
