
Thomas McCusker retiring after 44 years as Town Counsel

Thomas P. McCusker announced in November 2018 that he would be retiring from Town Counsel at the end of December. A dedicated employee in the Town of Westwood, Tom has served the Westwood Community for 50 years.

After moving from Roslindale to Westwood with his wife Josie, Tom ran for and won a seat on the Board of Selectmen in 1968 and served two terms until 1974. After stepping down from the Board of Selectmen, Tom sought the position of Town Counsel, a position he then held for the next 44 years. Over the course of those years, Tom has provided invaluable legal advice, opinions, counsel and defense to various town officials, boards and committees, and attending all of Annual, Special and Fall Town Meetings held during his tenure.

Although never in the lime light, Tom's advice and opinions have shaped the community to what it is today by providing guidance to board

members, staff and residents on a variety of issues. As Town Counsel, Tom was responsible for meeting with department heads, staff and officials to advise them on legal matters

including wording of decisions, ethics, public documents, open meeting and conformance with General Laws, Federal Laws and the Westwood Charter and Bylaws. He would also represent and settle matters before Superior Court, District Court, Land Court, Appellate Tax Board and Industrial Accident Board and with individuals and companies. Finally, Tom prepared warrant and zoning articles to be brought before Town Meeting and assist the Town Moderator in preparation for the conduct of Town Meeting.

The Town Officials, staff and residents want to wish Tom the best of luck in his retirement and know he will stay close by in his hometown of Islington.

Westwood's Thomas Philbin recognized by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts at annual awards ceremony given to recognize clean energy initiatives

Thomas Philbin, Westwood's Energy
Manager, was honored at the Massachusetts
State House on December 6, 2018 with a
Public Sector Individual Award in the 12th
annual Leading by Example (LBE) awards. These awards, given
by the Baker-Polito administration, recognize those who promote
clean energy and sustainable initiatives. Additionally, Philbin
was awarded congratulatory citations on the LBE award by the
Massachusetts State Senate and Legislature.

Philbin received this honor for introducing numerous clean energy initiatives and encouraging broad stakeholder collaboration across the Town of Westwood. Initially Philbin's position was funded by a DOER Green Communities Energy Manager two year grant award. Since that time, the town has enthusiastically continued funding the Energy Manager position based on Philbin's early accomplishments which include efforts advancing the installation of 780 kW of solar in the town, extensive energy efficiency projects, initiating efforts for DOER Green Community designation, and planning for future "near zero energy" buildings.

Over an extensive career in the energy field, Philbin has been involved in numerous power projects throughout the world and specifically in Energy Efficiency efforts for over 20 years. Philbin is a resident of Westwood and has served as Westwood's Energy Manager since 2013. The award and congratulatory citations were presented to Philbin by Nick Connors, the Green Communities Director. The Westwood Select Board also honored Philbin at their board meeting on December 17, 2018.

Philbin is an alumnus of the Manhattan College with a BS in Physics and the University of Michigan with a Masters and PhD in Environmental Health Sciences.

Did You Know...

Fire Safety Tips for Spring Cleaning

Did You Know... it's not too soon to start thinking about spring cleaning? Even though it's still chilly outside, when making a spring cleaning list consider these fire safety tips:

- Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a reported home fire in half. Make sure you have working smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home. Test them at least once a month by pushing the test button; replace batteries twice a year when we change the clocks and immediately if the alarm "chirps" a warning that the battery is low.
- The leading cause of home dryer fires is failure to clean the lint filter. Clean the lint filter after every load of laundry and remove any lint that has collected around the drum.
- Chimney's should be inspected and cleaned at least once a year. Having your chimney serviced in the spring will get rid of the buildup that could potentially cause more damage if left until the fall. Chimney technicians usually have more availability in the spring, too.

Funding awards to promote cultural diversity and education

The Westwood Cultural Council, part of the larger Massachusetts Cultural Council, has finalized its grant awarding process for the 2019 grant year. They received sixteen applications and awarded 8 grants.

The Massachusetts Cultural Council distributes funds to local cultural councils who then grant funds to arts and humanities projects in their own communities. Each local community is free to make funding decisions that they feel best meet the particular needs of their own community. The Westwood Cultural Council's priority is to fund projects that reach residents of all ages and which promote cultural diversity as well as education.

This year the Council funded, either whole or in part, a variety of projects. The COA will receive funding for a musical performance by Tommy Rull. The Westwood Historical Society received money to sponsor a program by author William Martin to discuss his novel *Back Bay*, including the historic development of Boston's Back Bay, and the Westwood Players received funds towards the presentation of the musical, Junie B. Jones.

The Library received funding for two programs: Gregory Maichack will be presenting another of his well-received pastel painting workshops; and in April the community will have the opportunity to hear various instruments from around the world, including the hammered dulcimer and the Celtic harp, when Magical Strings perform.

The schools received grants as well. The Integrated Preschool will host a program by the New England Aquarium. The Martha Jones School students will have the opportunity to enjoy the Crabgrass Puppet Theater and some Westwood High Students will be able to Be A Maker — a J term hands-on experience.

The Council is currently accepting applications for next year's grant cycle. The Massachusetts Cultural Council now requires online applications only. For more information contact westwoodculturalcouncil@gmail.com or go to www.mass-culture.org.

NEWS from the Town Clerk's Office

Dog licensing for 2019 is ongoing through March 31, 2019.

- You may license your dog by mail, provided you include a copy of a current rabies certificate and a self-addressed stamped envelope. If you are licensing your dog for the first time, proof of spay or neutering is also required.
- Licenses will be valid from January 1, 2019 until December 31, 2019.
- You may license your dog online by going to the following link: https://www.doglicenses.us/MA/ Westwood/
- You must license your dog on an annual basis.
- If you own more than 4 dogs this is considered a "Personal Kennel" per MGL c. 140 §136A.
- You must go through a special permit application process through the Zoning Board of Appeals to license a kennel.
- Failure to license your dog on or before March 31, 2019 may result in a fine of \$25.00, per town bylaws §184-10,B.(1)
- Any person 70 years of age or older, upon proof of age, shall be exempt from the annual fee for one dog, per household, per year. The owner of a kennel license, age 70 years of age or older, shall be excluded from this exemption. Dogs must still be licensed on or before March 31 of any given year per Town Bylaws § 184-10C (1).

Licensing Fees are as follows:

Dogs not Neutered or Spayed:\$15.00Dogs Neutered or Spayed:\$10.00

Kennel fees-please contact the Town Clerk's office

Please be sure to include the correct licensing fee. If you are unsure, Please contact the Town Clerks office at 781.326.3964.

If you have not returned it please do so. Failure to return the Census may cause a voter to be designated as inactive on the voting list (M.G.L, Ch.51, § 4). If your household did not receive a 2019 Annual Town Census

Westwood Community Electricity Aggregation

Save Money. Go Green.

The Select Board is co-sponsoring an article with the Westwood Environmental Action Committee for the spring Town Meeting that aims to offer residents lower, more stable electricity rates and renewable energy options while reducing reliance on carbon-producing fossil fuels.



Working with the Town's Energy Manager, Tom Philbin, this article will authorize the Town through its Select Board to select a company to aggregate electricity for its residents and businesses which will encourage the supply of electricity produced by renewable energy. Community Electricity

Community Electricity Aggregation

Aggregation (CEA) is a state-approved program that allows towns to purchase energy in bulk and pass savings along to residents. Over 125 Massachusetts communities already use CEA. Communities in this area include Dedham, Ashland and Holliston. CEA costs the town nothing and does not raise taxes on residents. An example of savings from Sudbury's program, which includes 5% more renewable energy than the state minimum requirement, are shared in the following chart.

Rates from Sudbury's Current CEA Program

Eversource winter rate for Basic Service (Jan. 2019-June 2019)	Sudbury's Aggregation Rate (fixed for 3 years)
13.59 cents per kWh	10.75 cents per kWh

Would this program replace Eversource as my electric utility?

No. Eversource would remain the electric utility for Westwood and would continue to deliver your electricity.

This program would change the **supplier** on your Eversource bill, and it would change the rate that is used to calculate the **Supply** charges on your Eversource bill. You would continue to receive your bill from Eversource, you would continue to pay Eversource, and you would continue to call Eversource if your power goes out.

Would I need to sign a contract?

No. There is no contract to sign and no installation of any equipment. You can leave the CEA program without penalty at any time. You can choose to opt out of the program.

How would I join the program?

Customers currently receiving Eversource's default basic service would be automatically enrolled in the CEA program. However, you can choose to opt out of the program. Customers who currently have their electricity supplied by a competitive supplier would need to opt into the program.

Our Programs—and your invitation

This winter, we were delighted to host the following programs:

- ◆ The New England Hurricane of 1938. In January, Sarah Sycz Jaworski, from Historic New England, shared wonderful photos and a wealth of information about the massive hurricane that hit New England on September 21, 1938. It was one of the most destructive storms in American history, causing more than 600 deaths and \$400 million in property damage.
- ♦ Our Own "Antiques Roadshow." In February, we hosted a mini "Antiques Roadshow" with Michael B. Grogan, President/Chief Auctioneer for Grogan & Company. Michael regaled us with his own stories and then provided expert verbal appraisals for the paintings, jewelry and silver that people brought to the program.
- ◆ Open Mic Nights. A vibrant Westwood High School group asked for permission to use the Fisher School for three Open Mic nights. They filled the venue each time and the audience so appreciated hearing and seeing the up-and-coming musicians, singers and performers.

And coming up...

- ◆ A History of the Irish in Boston. On March 12th (from 7 to 8:30 pm), Christopher Daley will talk about the waves of Irish immigrants who came to Boston and how they influenced and impacted our history. This program starts in the mid-17th century and continues through the 1950s (when many Irish rose up the ranks and gained power within the Boston political scene).
- ♦ Our 1800s School Day. In May, the Historical Society will host Westwood's third graders at the Fisher School. This program gives our schoolchildren the opportunity to step back in time and see what school was like in the 1800s. The program was originally designed by Joan Swann and Elaine Nye, continued by Irene Buonopane and is now coordinated by Charlie

Donahue. This year, Charlie expects to have the help of over 20 volunteers!

A Jewish Holiday That Celebrates the Triumph of Laughter Over Evil



Each March the Jewish holiday of Purim rolls around. It is said that when Purim season arrives, joy increases

Purim is based on biblical story of Esther. It takes place in the capital of the Persian empire approximately 2500 years ago. The Jews of Persia have made a comfortable life in the empire and have become one of many acculturated minorities within the fabric of Persian life. The story follows Esther, a young Jewish woman who is chosen by the king to become one of the king's many wives, and soon becomes his favorite. Esther hides her true identity, until the king's viceroy plots to kill the whole Jewish community to settle a vendetta he has with Esther's uncle. Esther bravely comes before the king, and

reveals her true identity as a Jew. In embracing her identity, Esther stands up for her people and foils the wickedness of the king's viceroy, Haman.

On the surface, the story of Purim is somber and serious. A minority community narrowly escapes persecution. One person embraces her difference and stands up to evil. Yet, the holiday is celebrated

with feasting, parties, and costume carnivals. Jewish communities put on funny skits called a *shpiel* to re-enact the story. Humor and laughter end up vanquishing the evil plot.

On Sunday, March 24 the Temple Beth David community will celebrate Purim. The *shpiel* begins at 10:00 a.m. and the carnival, with bouncy house, games, food, face painting and more begins at 11:00 a.m. It is lots of fun for kids and many come in costume! Carnival bracelets for unlimited access to the games and activities are \$10 for Temple Beth David members, \$15 for all others, and any child under 5 is \$5.

Hale Reservation

Westwood locals running like Hale in the Boston Marathon

On April 15, Westwood residents Christina Wysocki and father-daughter duo Jordan and Chloe Warshaw will run in the 123rd Boston Marathon as part of **Team Hale**. The three will join 12 other runners who have been selected to receive invitational entries in exchange for raising funds and awareness for the local nonprofit.

Hale has been an official charity partner with the Boston Athletic Association (BAA) since 2013. Hale's mission of offering educational and recreational opportunities that develop self-confidence, inspire passion for learning, and encourage appreciation for the natural environment fits in line with the BAA's requirement that all partners strengthen local communities and promote a healthy lifestyle.

The three Westwood runners have been working since the fall to help raise funds to support two programs focused on Boston Public Schools (BPS) students: Hale Outdoor Learning Adventures (HOLA) and Intrepid Academy at Hale (IAH). HOLA seeks to prevent summer learning loss, encourage academic gains, and promote healthy physical activity, during the summer months so

students are ready to begin the next grade in the fall. IAH is an 18 week outdoor program that breaks down the walls of conventional schools and enables high school juniors to earn course credits through nontraditional, active educational experiences.

Existing programs like HOLA and IAH are often limited to more affluent populations but Hale is closing the opportunity gap by working with

students who otherwise may never have access to such experiences. Time actively spent outdoors leads to mental stimulation and has numerous health benefits, advantages Hale strives to share regardless of income.

These Westwood runners are all very familiar with Hale's impactful programs. They are excited to represent the organization as they train and fundraise in the weeks leading up to the Marathon Monday.

- He is a graduate of the US Army Intelligence School, US Army Artillery and Missile School, US Army Military Police School, US Army Chemical and Biological School, US Army Command and General Staff College and the US Army War College.
- He is a former member of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Joint Terrorism Task Force.
- He is currently an instructor in NIMS, ICS, and Incident Response to Terrorist Bombing at the Criminal Justice Training Council in Massachusetts.



Another Successful Year for the Bullying Prevention Theater Program!

Since 2011, Westwood Youth & Family Services has coordinated

the Bullying Prevention Theater (BPT) Program. This unique program was developed by both adult staff and high school students, with a primary goal of creating a realistic and powerful way to educate and support the sixth-grade students of Westwood on the topic of bullying, particularly the effectiveness of bystanders. Given its distinctive approach and creative content, BPT won a Governor's Citation Award in 2011.

This year's BPT program began in September 2018 with twenty-six high school mentors spending over 750 total hours preparing and rehearsing for the performances which took place at Thurston Middle School in January. Mentors enthralled the sixth-grade class at Thurston with five skits about bullying, followed by thoughtful classroom discussions and related activities. The 234 sixth-graders were presented with real-life scenarios about bullying based on stereotypes, gender differences, and peer pressure, among other topics. Mentors acted out various ways in which bystanders can help to stop bullying from happening and offered strategies to take the power away from bullies.

The success of the program would not have been possible without support from the faculty and staff at both Thurston Middle School and Westwood High School. Most of all, Westwood Youth & Family Services wants to thank the high school mentors for their dedication to rehearsals and the performances, despite their very busy schedules! 



Dear Westwood Residents,

March 2019

Last year, the Town of Westwood took important steps forward on the journey to modernize our elementary schools and enhance student learning. We were accepted into the Massachusetts School



Building Authority (MSBA) program, which provides financing and guidance for cities and towns that need to build new schools. We successfully completed the Eligibility Phase and formed a School Building Committee

to oversee the process. With the majority of Westwood residents voting to approve funding at Town Meeting last May, we have now officially been accepted into the Feasibility Phase. As we move ahead, it is our commitment to keep lines of communication open and report developments that are of importance to the community.

The next step in the process is to hire a project manager and a designer to work with the School Building Committee. These people will play critical roles by working with MSBA to determine what options are possible, taking into account what the community needs and MSBA requires. We are currently drafting a Request for Service for the project manager position with the goal of having that individual hired in time to attend either the MSBA board meeting on June 3 or on July 15, 2019. Once that step is complete, we will go through a similar process to hire a designer.

MSBA has very specific rules regarding the projects for which it will reimburse cities and towns. Westwood was invited into the MSBA based primarily on the condition of our oldest elementary school, the Hanlon School, which was built in 1951. As a result, any new project must include Hanlon. During last fall, Westwood and the MSBA prepared enrollment projections to address what we believe our needs will be. The projections indicate renewed growth in our elementary

school student population over the next 10 years. Enrollment ultimately determines how much square footage, how many classrooms, and how many other rooms a new school will have.

For the Feasibility Phase of the project, the town presented MSBA three school building options—each of which would present a number of possibilities. The three are:

- 1. Rebuild Hanlon School for a capacity of 315 students.
- 2. Build a combined Hanlon/Deerfield School for a capacity of 560 students.
- 3. Build a combined Hanlon/Sheehan School for a capacity of 685 students.

Once in place, the project manager and designer will study the options and estimate the costs associated with each one so we have a clear picture of our choices when we hold community forums this fall.

What this all means is that by the fall, we will be ready to begin our community engagement phase. Westwood is lucky to have the opportunity to use state dollars to defray the cost of this project. But, whatever plan is ultimately approved, it will be with the input of the community and will leave us well positioned to continue providing the highest quality education.

We look forward to seeing this exciting opportunity unfold and will provide updates leading up to the community forums.
