RECYCLABLES

Must be dry, loose (single stream, not bagged) and placed in your recycling barrel

What are considered RECYCLABLES?

- Cardboard- flattened
- Glass food and beverage containers: brown, clear or green- empty
- Magazines, glossy inserts and pamphlets
- Mail
- Newspaper
- Paperboard (uncoated): cereal boxes, food and snack boxes
- Paper (uncoated): printing, writing or office paper
- Plastic bottles (PET symbol #1)- with screw tops only, empty
- Plastic bottles (HDPE symbol #2): empty
 - Milk bottles
 - Water bottles
 - Detergent containers
 - Shampoo containers, etc.
- Plastic containers with symbols #3 to #7: empty
 - No expanded polystyrene (see description below)

NON-RECYCLABLES- include, <u>but not limited</u> to the following: DO not put in your Recycling Barrel-

- Expanded polystyrene: food service foam containers, trays and cups
- Batteries
- Ceramics or porcelain
- Coat hangers
- Coated cardboard
- Construction waste and wood
- Flexible plastic or film packaging and multi-laminated materials
- Food waste and liquids, containers containing such items
- Glass and metal cookware/bakeware
- Hoses, cords and wires
- Household appliances and electronics
- Light Bulbs
- Medical waste-syringes, IV bags and other medical supplies
- Microwavable trays
- Mirrors
- Napkins, paper towels, tissue, paper plates, paper cups, and plastic utensils
- Plastic bags and bagged materials (even if containing recyclables)
- Plastic unnumbered
- Propane tanks
- Textiles, cloth or any fabric (bedding, pillows, sheets, etc.)
- Window and auto glass
- Yard waste
- Excluded materials or containers which contained*

*Excluded Materials:

- Radioactive, volatile, corrosive, flammable or explosive materials
- Biomedical, infectious, bio-hazardous or toxic abuse or material
- Medical Waste
- Hazardous Waste
