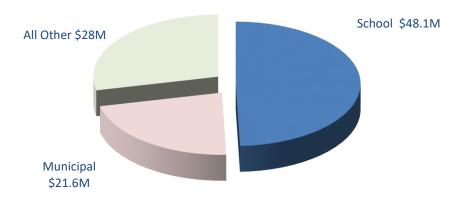

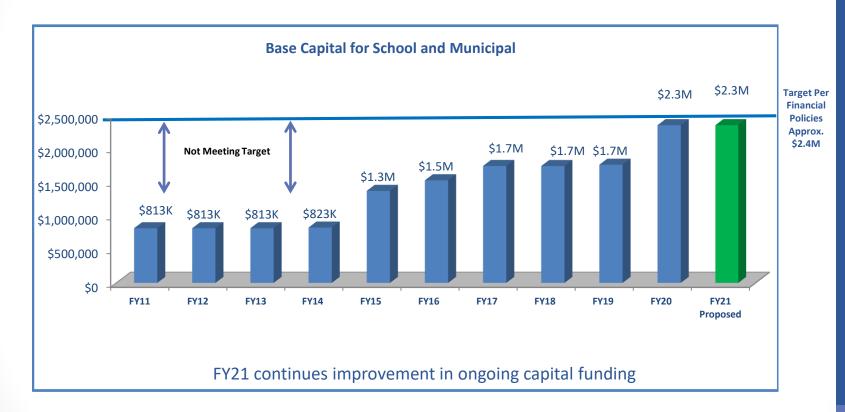

- Could not meet policy target for many years during difficult economic budget cycles.
- The Town has made steady progress in increasing the ongoing capital budget.

FY20 continues improvement in ongoing capital funding.

Capital Budget – Additional Capital Article Beyond the Base

- Since FY17, the Town Meeting has approved an "additional" capital budget article beyond the main base articles.

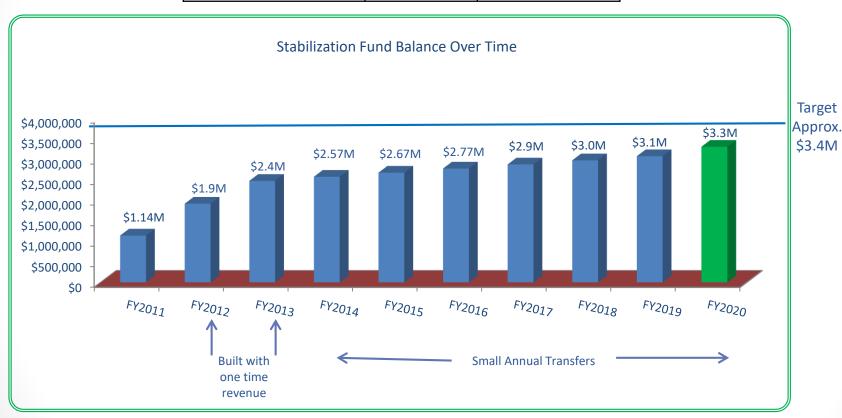

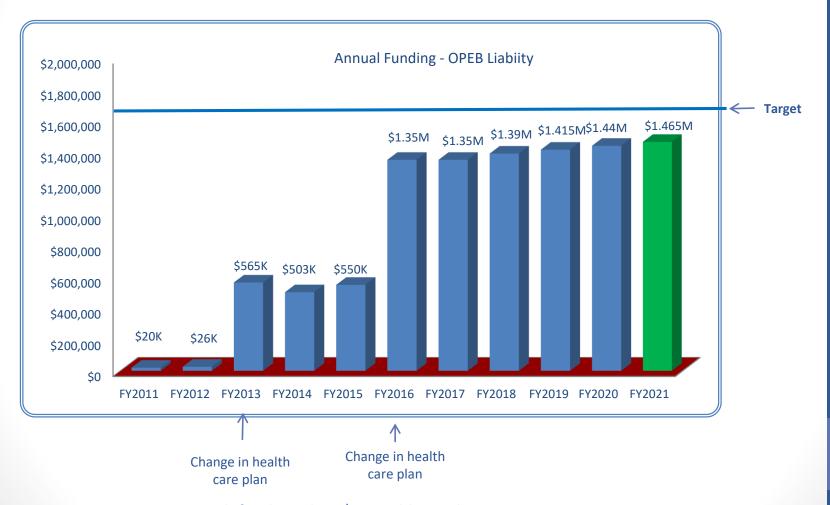

Article Select Board 1 – Fire Alarm System Regulations – Revision to Language

To see if the town would amend the town General Bylaws Article 16, Chapter 175 Fire Alarm Systems so as to add Section 175-5 (J) to read as follows:

That the town of Westwood Fire Department will cease maintaining the hard wired fire alarm system throughout Town and will only support the Radio Master Alarm Box system. All properties utilizing the hard wired system will need to switch over to a Radio Master Fire Alarm Box or 3rd party provider, in accordance with the Massachusetts State Building Code, 780 CMR, as amended from time to time, prior to June 1, 2023 and notify the Westwood Fire Department in writing upon conversion. If a master box owner fails to comply with this section, the Chief may assess a fine of \$50 per day for each day of noncompliance.

Article Select Board 2 – Non Binding Resolution Regarding Net Zero Energy for School and Municipal Building Construction

For the purpose of this article. Net zero energy buildings are buildings for which the energy used for heating, ventilation, cooling, plug-in loads, and any other operations, is no more than the amount of offsetting renewable energy produced onsite.

Now therefore be it resolved that construction of all new schools and municipal buildings in Westwood be designed with the goal of achieving net zero energy consumption and net zero greenhouse gas emissions.

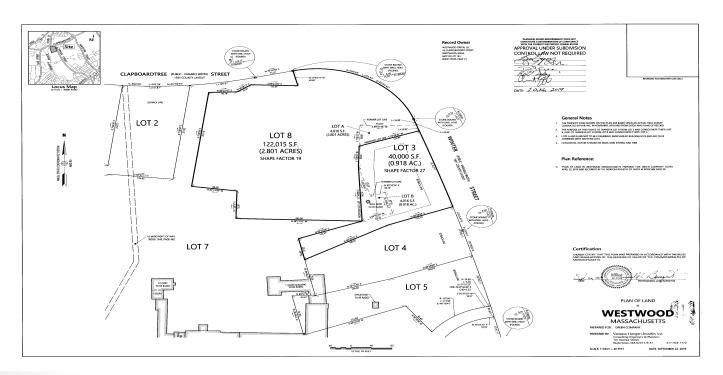
Article Select Board 3 – Overnight Parking Restrictions Change of Hours

To see if the Town would vote to amend Chapter 380 Section 11 of the Town Bylaws as follows:

It shall be illegal for owner or operator of any vehicle, other than one acting in an emergency to park said vehicle on any street or place where the traveling public has a right of access between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 7:00 AM of any during the period of November 15th and April 1st, pending inclement weather conditions that require snow and ice treatment.

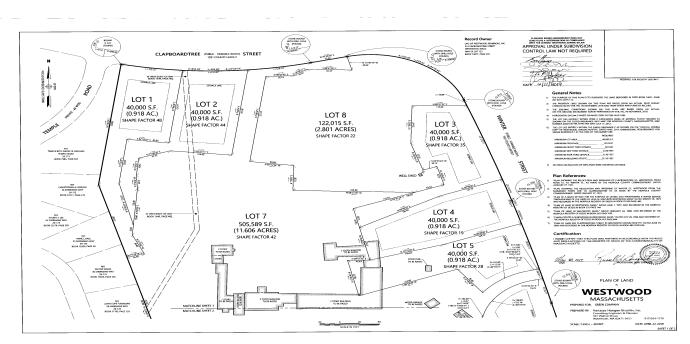
