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

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The original eighteenth century core is still visible on the south side as the first- and second-story of this looming full three-story facade. The five-bay configuration, hipped roof, twin chimneys, and six-over-six sash remain from the early house. The rest is a result of a major expansion in the early 1900s. Today the house consists of the tall five-bay, threestory hipped roof center block, flanking two-story, two-bay elements that are slightly recessed from the main facade, an additional two-story element on the east side that is three bays deep, a four-bay two-story element attached to the rear of the original center block, and a projecting open porch with paired Tuscan-like tapered columns supporting a flat roof over a wide wrapping flagstone terrace on the west end of the house. The added blocks all are united by a Chinese Chippendale balustrade atop the second-story flat roofs. Most windows have six-over-six sash set in slightly projecting molded frames. Some are paired or in strings of three on the additions, and some windows are tall multilight casements or large multi-light set in a single frame. The main block has a center entrance with a projecting pediment porch. The door appears proportionally tall and narrow for this block. An entrance porch also projects from the rear eastern most building element. The end open terrace/porch has a built in exterior fireplace with segmental arched french doors flanking this huge feature.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

Part of the house was one of the early Colburn houses along High Street and was located next to High Street until being moved up the hill in 1911 by the early twentieth century owner, Allan Forbes (1874-1955), who also was responsible for the large additions. First known owner according to the 1818 map was Samuel Colburn. The vital records show only one Samuel of this era, born in 1777 and died in 1816. Dr. Nathaniel Ames diary tells of amputating Samuel Colburn's leg in 1814. This property passed to Samuel Colburn's son, Ephriam and then Ephriam Jr. Through a greater part of the 1800s the property was owned and occupied by Isaacus Colburn (1793-1879), son of Isaac Jr. and Elizabeth Colburn. He married Louisa Fisher in 1820. Isaac Colburn (1766-1845) lived at 381 High Street having come to West Dedham in 1789 as a schoolteacher. It is said that his father lived here. Further research is necessary to determine whether his father was Samuel Colburn mentioned above. In 1850 and in 1870 Isaacus Colburn was assessed for a house, barn and ten acres. A carriage house was added by 1870 and the barn was large and attached according to later photographs. Following Isaacus Colburn, son of Isaac, the property was owned by Henry Sidney Draper (1827-1907) who had purchased other farms and owned most of the land west of High through to Grove and north of Summer Street in West Dedham. Draper had a thriving dairy farm and was a milk dealer. In 1903, Draper sold to Allan Forbes who was President of State Street Bank. Forbes moved the house in 1911 and made some additions. In 1922 most of the additions were made and in 1927 the third floor was added to the center part and a laundry wing was attached - the eastern rear ell.


