Coming soon! Wentworth Hall nears completion



Westwood's new Wentworth Hall is really beginning to take shape. The new building was designed by McKay Architects to incorporate the old Wentworth Hall as part of a much larger 8,000 square foot structure which maintains the scale of its historic forbearer. Upon completion, it will be home to the Islington Branch Library and the Department of Youth & Family Services. The new Wentworth Hall will also offer a spacious, fully-accessible Community Center on the lower level.

Tower Construction is now finishing work on the new roof and carefully fitting panelized wall sections from the circa 1884 building into the fabric of the new Wentworth Hall. The project is on schedule for move-in this summer, and we are looking forward to welcoming the public into this charming new space in the heart of Islington Center which is sure to be enjoyed for generations to come.

Household Bulk Collection Event will be held the week of March 22, 2021:

Residents can place one bulk item at their curbside for pickup free of charge. Pickup will be on your regular scheduled trash day. This is for bulk items only, **NO** appliances, TVs, computers, monitors (nothing with a plug), metal items, construction, hazardous or yard waste. Think of a wooden piece of furniture; mattress or a box spring; large plastic item such as a kayak or children's play toy.

Yard Waste Collection Requirements:

- Leaves **must** be placed in paper leaf recycling bags or loosely in barrels that are clearly marked "leaves." Do not put yard waste in your Westwood Recycling or Trash barrel for disposal.
- Each barrel and/or bag shall not exceed 45 pounds. Anything in excess of 45 pounds will not be collected.
- **No** plastic bags can be collected with yard waste, as they will cause the entire truck load to be rejected at the composting site.
- Place barrels and bags curbside by 7:00am on your trash pickup day and Waste Management has until 6:00pm to pick up.
- DO's: grass clippings, leaves, weeds, small twigs
- DONT's: rocks, stones, gravel, sand, dirt, wood, plastic, bags exceeding 45 pounds

The Westwood Early Childhood Program is a Coordinated Family and Community Engagement (CFCE) grant funded by the MA Department of Early Education and Care. We support parents as their child's first teacher by providing early learning and literacy activities that enhance meaningful interaction between parents and children. The CFCE program also provides resources and referrals that help connect families to local support services.


New Initiatives

Westwood residents have long enjoyed the acres and acres of open space at Hale. Over the past year, the pandemic has forced the organization to make some adjustments to their policies for visitors and program participants alike but the staff remains committed to finding ways for people to be outdoors and active of their property.

One particular change is the creation of yearlong memberships to Hale. As an independent nonprofit, members allow Hale to keep 20 miles of trails and over 1,100 acres open and maintained. Annual membership lets Hale share the property with outdoor enthusiasts and offer programs that serve tens of thousands of people from more than 70 communities.

Memberships benefits include: two parking decals that entitling members to park at Hale (space permitting) from Mar. 1, 2021 until Feb. 28, 2022, discounts on activities and programs and special registration opportunities for events and a copy of the Hale Magazine.

The organization has also had to reimagine many of their summer offerings. As did last year, Hale will continue to offer their well-known camp programs following guidelines from the Department of Public Health.

In addition, there will be opportunities to partake in several new programs at Hale. Those longing for more time in nature, might try Hale's new Outdoor Fitness and Recreation program that encourages lap swimming, boating, trail running and more. Folks looking for a more relaxing afternoon, will want to check out Summer Days at the beach. FOUNDATION FOR WESTWOOD EDUCATION DELIVERS SPECIAL GRANT FUNDING TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY NEEDS DURING COVID-19 CRISIS

ACCESS TO REMOTE LEARNING TOOLS

The Foundation for Westwood Education's special grant cycle funded, among other programs, subscription based access for the Westwood Public Schools to utilize a remote learning tool known as NearPod across all grade levels. This interactive platform is designed to optimize student engagement and is especially useful during this current hybrid learning model.

NearPod delivers an extended library of existing curriculum based content, including games, quizzes, and other interactive exercises, all of which may be modified by individual teachers to align with their class benchmarks. In fact, Doreen Cusick, a fourth grade teacher at Sheehan Elementary School confirms how freely she is able to adapt the pre-loaded lessons to meet her students' needs, "If one of the lessons includes questions about something we haven't covered yet, I can tailor it to their particular learning set by deleting the irrelevant material and adding an additional question or two."

In addition to NearPod's pre-loaded library, teachers can easily add their own course material from different mediums like Google and PowerPoint to the platform. This allows them to utilize the existing coursework they've spent a career refining to suit their individual teaching style. As an added bonus, the assessment tools available in NearPod allow teachers to efficiently gauge student participation and growth and recalibrate learning, if necessary.

Almost all of the teachers and administrators who provided feedback were specifically excited about one tool in Nearpod. The "Collaborate Board" replaces the typical question/response model that students and teachers have been engaging in for generations. Inviting students to share their thoughts about a topic anonymously has increased class participation by encouraging students who might otherwise be hesitant to wade into group discussions to 'raise their hands' and engage with their classmates. This is helping students feel connected and lessons feel cohesive, despite the hybrid model. This tool allows teachers to target classroom discussion to include the perspective of all of their students. According to Westwood High School Social Studies Teacher Jonas Sherr, classroom dialogue improves around any given question "because the students have thought about their response and written it down" and, "the quality of discussion is way better."



SUPPORTING SEL RESOURCES

A considerable component of this funding was allocated to address social emotional learning among K-8 students, responding to the need for programming in this area made even more urgent due to the ongoing pandemic.

Within the elementary schools, all classroom teachers were provided Responsive Classroom training resources. The Responsive Classroom framework provides educators with strategies for developing routines, using supportive language, and integrating opportunities for social-emotional skill-building throughout classroom experiences. According to Erin Kuehn, the K-8 SEL Coordinator for Westwood Public Schools, elementary teachers are using the responsive classroom framework to enhance classroom morning meetings and closing circles – helping students have a positive start and end to the day by providing opportunities for sharing, reflection and community building. In addition, grant funding provided elementary classroom and specials teachers with a series of Energizer resources. Energizers are activities used throughout the day to support students in learning how to gain control over their energy levels and body movements. Energizers include activities geared at invigorating students, as well as more calming activities designed to promote important self-regulation skills.

Within the middle school, funding provided by the Foundation for Westwood Education has been used to integrate two new resources, Refocus and Recharge Activities and Middle School Motivators, into the existing social-emotional learning curriculum. Like elementary Energizers, Refocus and Recharge activities help students to continue developing skills in energy level management and self-regulation. Middle School Motivators provide a variety of teaching strategies that can be used in the classroom to enhance student engagement and promote SEL skills. Motivators support teachers in helping middle school students gain skills in developing a positive mindset, learning to identify bullying and harassment, regulating thoughts and emotions, engaging in productive discussions, managing relationships, and resolving social conflict.

Within the Westwood Public Schools, the K-8 social emotional curriculum is grade specific, and students continuously build upon learning and skills developed in previous years. Westwood's K-8 SEL Coordinator Erin Kuehn states she has been "struck by the resilience of students" who continue to demonstrate a "joyful vibe and energy" and have "adapted really well" despite the unprecedented educational landscape of the 2020-2021 school year.

The Foundation is proud to have assisted in providing these extraordinary programs at a time when it was greatly needed and we look forward to continuing our mission by supplementing existing school and community agency budgets with grant funding to maintain their exceptional levels of programming.

Learn More About Westwood's Proposed Elementary School Community Meeting Set for March 18

The Westwood School Committee is inviting residents to a virtual community meeting on Thursday, March 18, at 7:00pm, to learn all the details of the town's proposed new elementary school and how it's being funded.

"This project not only consolidates two of our five elementary schools, but will also provide a lot of community-wide benefits to the town," said Maya Plotkin, member of the School Committee and chair of the School Building Committee (SBC). "It's really important to be informed about this project because it will impact everyone."

The project, estimated to cost \$87 million, proposes to combine elementary students from the Hanlon and Deerfield districts. It would be located on the site of the current Hanlon School.

In April, the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) will review the town's plans, the final step before voting to approve an \$18 million reimbursement to the town.

With the MSBA's participation, we can provide a new school for two districts in one building project. It's a huge economic opportunity for Westwood."

"Soup to Nuts" Presentation

At the community meeting, the School Committee will make a "soup to nuts" presentation, Plotkin said, examining deteriorating conditions at existing elementary schools, why the School Committee chose to consolidate Hanlon and Deerfield, why the SBC opted to build a new school rather than renovate, what the new building will look like, and how much it will cost.

"We'll also talk about the economic impact on the town," she added. "It will be the most comprehensive community forum we've had." Residents will have an opportunity to ask questions, too.

Hanlon and Deerfield Schools were built in the 1950s and, while they have been well maintained, they both have significant issues due to their aging infrastructure and design, according to Plotkin. In February, a ceiling collapsed inside a Hanlon classroom, requiring the closure of the school for two days to make the necessary repairs. Luckily, it happened before students and teachers arrived for the day.

Town Meeting Votes

In May 2021, Town Meeting will vote on the SBC's request for \$1.46 million in bridge funding to allow the project's architects to move forward with their design work over the spring and summer. A special Town Meeting will be scheduled for the fall, at which time residents will vote on the entire project.

"By keeping the work going through the summer, we can break ground in July 2022, starting the outside site work in the middle of summer when the kids aren't there," Plotkin said. "Those are much better conditions in which to start a construction project."

If all goes as planned, the new school will open in Winter 2024.

Dog licensing for 2021 began on January 1, 2021 and is continuing through March 31, 2021.

- You may license your dog online, or by mail, provided you include a copy of a current rabies certificate.
- If you are licensing your dog for the first time, proof of spay or neutering is also required.
- Licenses will be valid from January 1, 2021 until December 31, 2021.
- You must license your dog on an annual basis.
- If you own more than 4 dogs this is considered a "Personal Kennel" per MGL c. 140 §136A.
- You must go through a special permit application process through the Zoning Board of Appeals
 to license a kennel. You must initially contact the building inspector at 781-320-1091.
- Failure to license your dog on or before March 31, 2021 may result in a fine of \$25.00, per town bylaws §184-10, B. (1).
- Please be sure to include the correct licensing fee. If you are unsure, please contact the Town Clerk's office at 781 326-3964 or townclerk@townhall.westwood.ma.us.

Licensing Fees are as follows:

Online convenience fee: \$2.00
Postage fee: \$1.00
Dogs not Neutered or Spayed: \$15.00
Dogs Neutered or Spayed: \$10.00

Residents ages 70 or older, the fee is waived for one dog per household (proof of age is required)

Kennel Fees-please contact the Town Clerk's office (special permit is required)

The 2021 Annual Town Census

- The Annual Town Census was mailed to each household in January 2021.
- It is extremely important that each household fills out the census form and returns it within 10 days of its receipt.
- The completed, signed form can also be scanned and emailed to census@townhall.westwood.ma.us.
- If you did not receive a form, you may download a form by visiting the Town Clerks webpage, or contact the Town Clerks office and one will be mailed to you.
- Failure to return the Annual Town Census may cause a voter to be designated as inactive on the voting list (M.G.L, Ch.51, § 4).
- **You may not register to vote or change your political party on the census form. To register to
 vote or make changes to your voter registration you may do so online by visiting https://www.sec.state.ma.us/ovr/

WCIA and COA Planning Celebrations for the Class of 2021

Two community groups are working on creative ways to celebrate WHS's Class of 2021. *Westwood Community in Action* is reimagining the annual **All Night Graduation Party** while the *Council on Aging* is launching a new program, "Seniors Celebrating Seniors"



More than 30 years ago, a group of parents formed *Westwood Community in Action*, a non-profit dedicated to organizing an overnight event to provide the Westwood High graduates a final night of celebration in a safe, fun, entertainment filled event. Since then, the *All Night Grad Party* has become one of the High School's most revered traditions. Plans for the event this year will be finalized once state and local guidelines for gathering are confirmed.

"The committee is dedicated to reimagining the event again this year and doing whatever it takes to give the WHS graduates a safe celebration" remarks Jennie Conway, one of the committee chairs.
