

### Westwood Moves all Voting Precincts Under One Roof at WHS

#### Important Information for the April 26 Election



Census data shows Westwood's population increased by 1,648 between 2020 and 2022, and now stands at 16,266. Due to this increase, the town had to establish a fifth voting precinct. Last month, the Westwood Select Board accepted the recommendation of the Town Clerk and the Board of Registrars to consolidate all voting locations into one place. From now on, all registered voters will cast ballots at the Westwood High School gymnasium, located at 200 Nahatan Street. Voters are advised to use the entrance for Westwood Recreation off Nahatan St. and look for signs.

When school is in session, from 7:25 a.m. to 2:05 p.m., there will be designated parking in the Recreation/Preschool parking lot. Because high school students already have designated parking spots in this lot, voters will not have access to those numbered spots until after school is dismissed.



The benefits of this new plan include:

- Surrounding communities have found that consolidation of precincts has proven to be cost effective and has resulted in a more efficient Election Day process.
- One location is easier for voters that are not sure where their precinct is and voters can be directed to their correct precinct without having to leave the building.
- Candidates and their supporters can be at one place to campaign and receive unofficial election results quickly when polls close.
- Westwood High School is centrally located and the most convenient location to consolidate all the precincts. It is the largest public building in Westwood, is ADA compliant and is easily accessible via several roadways.

All households were recently sent a postcard with detailed information regarding these changes. It will be helpful for voters to bring the card with them on Election Day so that you know what precinct you will be voting in.

#### Dog Licensing

Westwood residents are required to secure a license for their dogs. Those who have not yet received a 2022 license for their dog can still do so, but will



have to pay an additional \$25 fee. Here is what you need to know about licensing your dog:

- Licenses are valid from January 1, 2022 until December 31, 2022.
- You may license your dog by mail, provided you include a copy of a current rabies certificate and a self-addressed stamped envelope. If you are licensing your dog for the first time, please provide proof the animal was spayed or neutered.
- You may license your dog online by going to the following link: www.doglicenses.us/MA/Westwood
- All dogs six months and older must be licensed on an annual basis.
- According to Westwood's zoning bylaws, anyone owning more than three adult dogs must receive a personal kennel permit.
- Any person age 70 or older is exempt from the annual fee for one dog, per household, per year.

As Superintendent, I want to thank the Westwood community for its continued support and investment in our schools. # Holocaust Survivor Shares His Story with Westwood Eighth-Graders

Before 95-year-old Holocaust survivor Aron Greenfield spoke a word to eighth-graders from Westwood's Thurston Middle School, Rabbi Karen Citrin of Temple Beth David gave them a suggestion.

"I challenge you to listen and to imagine what it would be like to be in his shoes," said Citrin, who started her introduction with the story of her Uncle Harry and the number 141421. That number was tattooed on her uncle's arm, and decades later she says that number is imprinted in her memory.

Greenfield was only 15-years-old when his entire family was forced out of their home in Poland and into the ghettos. Rabbi Citrin pointed out that Greenfield wasn't much older than students he was addressing when he faced unimaginable atrocities.

"On September 1, 1939, my childhood and our lives ended," said Greenfield, recalling the day they were made to leave. "Two months later, our entire town was gathered to watch the hanging of my friend Aron Diamond. I heard him say The Shema (a Jewish prayer), and then he was gone."

Diamond was hanged for taking a piece of coal from a friendly Polish man. That man, and about 20 others, were hanged alongside Diamond for aiding Jewish families. Over 80 years later, Greenfield still has trouble sharing that story without emotion in his voice. He was one of nine children, and only two would survive WWII.

"The eighth grade ELA curriculum focuses on individual stories," explained Katherine Stewart, Humanities Department Chair. "These stories are a way for students to understand perspectives, gain empathy, and help them make sense of the world around them. What an honor it was for students to witness Mr. Greenfield's stories in person."

Greenfield recalled that German propaganda started long before any Nazi soldiers set foot onto Polish soil. There were signs throughout his hometown that vilified Jewish people. He said he attended a school that was over 80 percent Cath-

olic, and many days he had to run home from school to avoid the bullies threatening to beat him up.

Once in the ghetto, the 11 members of the Greenfield family, along with three other Jewish families, would share a room the size of an average dining room. "We slept on the floor, on the table," he said. "We didn't care. We were starving."

Food was so scarce that Greenfield and two of his brothers would sneak out early in the morning to get milk to bring home for their baby sister from a friendly Polish farmer. "We knew this was considered a crime and it was very dangerous," Greenfield said.

About 7 months after arriving, Greenfield recalled, ghetto occupants were lined up and forced to go either left or right. His mother insisted he wear adult clothing, because she had figured out those being sent to the left were deemed unfit to work. His mother and sisters were sent to the left. "I saw a Nazi throw my 4-year-old sister into a truck like she was a piece of garbage," he recalled. "I never saw them again."

Greenfield was in nine different concentration camps before he was liberated. He recounted in detail many harrowing stories of the conditions, the starvation and the death all around him. The hope that his parents might still be alive, he said, is what kept him from killing himself.

"At the last camp, we slept on the ground, and we used each other's stomachs as pillows," Greenfield recalled. "I



woke up one morning and the boy under me had died. The first thing I did was steal his shoes. How sad is that?"

After being liberated, Greenfield and his one surviving sibling came to Boston, where he met and married his wife Martha and raised one daughter. Today, they have three grandchildren. The couple resides in Norwood and still work at Brenner's Children's Shop, the retail store they opened together years ago.

"It was an amazing experience to be able to hear this man talk about his experiences," said eighth-grader Hank Murray. "Even now, and maybe later in our lifetime, there [will] be people who say the Holocaust wasn't real, and I think it's our duty to remember the experiences and memories of Aron Greenfield."

During his one-hour talk, Greenfield mentioned that he has been interviewed by historians and the director Steven Spielberg to share his memories. He also warned students that the horror of the Holocaust is not just history. "It's happening around the world right now. It's happening to other people. This is why it's important for them to know. I am a witness to history, and now that you have heard my story, you are a witness, too."

#### 7th Grade Writers Contest

On Wednesday, April 6, Thurston Middle School's seventh-grade students attended the Writers Conference, which returned this year after a two-year hiatus due to the pandemic. Writers in attendance included Kip Wilson, Francisco Stork, Jennifer DeLeon, Regie Gibson, Desmond Hall, Mike Reiss, Dave Wedge (virtually), Susan Tan, Nicole Yang, Sarah Marie Jette, Adrienne Kisner, and Rory Power.

Students began the day with a walk to the high school auditorium to listen to a keynote panel, hosted by seventh-grade ELA teachers Caitie Peterson and Tara Goodwin, and featuring local authors DeLeon, Wilson and Stork.

The panelists discussed their experiences as professional authors, their strategies for managing challenges such as writer's block, and how they take inspiration from their life experiences.

### A Homecoming for Westwood's New METCO Coordinator

Candace Bass is a proud alumnus of the Westwood High School Class of 2004 and of the Metropolitan Council for Educational Opportunity (METCO) program. A Roxbury native, Bass journeyed every day from her urban neighborhood to attend school in the suburbs. That was the plan her mother came up with when she was just a baby, and it has led her back to Westwood to oversee the program that shaped her life.

Since the 1960's METCO has enrolled thousands of Boston students of color in predominantly white communities. MET-CO's mission is to provide students with a "strong academic foundation rich in cultural, educational, ethnic, socioeconomic, and racial diversity," while fostering the opportunity for children from Boston and from neighboring suburbs to develop a deeper understanding of each other in an integrated public-school setting.

"The real world looks a lot like what I experienced in Westwood, as opposed to what my neighborhood in Roxbury was like," Bass explained. "METCO prepared me to be in situations and to be able to socialize with many people from different walks of life."

Calling it a "full circle moment," Bass says she is excited to be the new Elementary School METCO Coordinator for Westwood Public Schools. Westwood is one of only two METCO communities which welcomes Boston students beginning in middle school, but that will change next fall when the town adds 35 elementary school students spread out between kindergarten and fifth grade to

the program. With the addition of these elementary students next year, the district will have about 84 students from Boston.

Bass says her first few years in Westwood were tough. "It was hard to find my footing and middle school is a rough time anyway," she said. "It took some time to acclimate and when you went through something tough, we had a solid foundation with the kids from Boston and there were always adults to support the process."

By the time she entered high school, Bass says, she and other Boston students had really hit their stride. "When the transition to high school took place, it felt very natural. I was vice president of my class, I participated in drama and in the poetry club, and I was on the track and field team."

Lateefah Franck, who serves as Westwood's Director of Diversity, Equity and Community Partnerships, and also oversees the district's METCO program, believes integrating Boston students at a younger age will allow them, and their families, to feel like part of the community at a faster pace.

"The onus is on us to build a community for our Boston students," said Franck. "As we build the program in kindergarten and first grade, almost everyone is a new parent. As educators, we almost have to be facilitators, teaching our kids and their families how to do school. To have our families share that experience from

the beginning and learn and build rela-

tionships will be so meaningful."


Westwood is one of 30 suburban METCO districts in the Commonwealth, but one of only two that has not yet included elementary school students. Bass and Franck emphasized the amount of effort

Franck emphasized the amount of effort necessary for students and their families from Boston to participate. Bass recalls she would get up at 5:00 a.m. to get to school and typically wouldn't be home until after 5:00 p.m.

"When I talk with Boston families that are coming in, I tell them it's like thinking about an independent school outside of their neighborhood community," said Franck. "The travel commitment is huge. A huge part of school is participating in clubs, sports, and activities. They need to think about the support system they have to support their child. I often tell our teachers there's a level of trust that our Boston families have to have in us in order to send them here. And we need to make sure those students and their families have an additional layer of community here in Westwood."

Bass says her mother was always invested in her daughter's education - right through her time as an undergraduate student at Fisk University in Nashville, as well as her early years teaching at charter schools. Bass's mother passed away three years ago, but she knows her mother would be thrilled to see her back in Westwood.

"I'm excited that this is a homecoming type of moment for me," said Bass. "But at the end of the day, I am an advocate for education. It's a 'cherry on top' that I get to advocate here in Westwood."

### Reminders from the Board of Health

#### **Private Wells**

Many residents may not realize that the Westwood Board of Health (BOH) oversees irrigation and drinking water wells on private property in town. The BOH's private well regulation is intended to protect public health and the general welfare of the residents of Westwood by ensuring that private wells producing water for irrigation and for human consumption are properly constructed and maintained. Protecting the quality of the water obtained from these wells is crucial to the overall health of the water system.

Residents who are selling their homes are required by the regulation to conduct water quality tests for both irrigation and drinking-water wells. The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection recommends that private wells be tested at regular intervals to ensure the water being consumed is safe. Homeowners should forward the results of their water tests to the BOH office prior to a change in ownership of the property on which the well is located. #### **Ticks**

Westwood is home to many parks and open space areas which are regularly utilized by residents. Unfortunately, we do see a number of residents stricken annually with tick-borne diseases that may have come from tick bites here in Westwood. Diseases



such as Lyme, Babesiosis, and Anaplasmosis are common in New England and Westwood is no exception. These diseases are transmitted by infected dog and deer ticks that attach to human hosts and transmit disease during feeding. Preventing ticks from attaching to your clothes or skin is the best protection against bites. Wearing long pants and shirts, using an effective insect repellent, and performing tick checks are all important strategies to protect against bites. Make it a habit to check everyone in your house, including pets, for ticks after spending time outdoors.

If you discover a tick embedded in your skin during a tick check, seek timely medical attention or attempt to remove the tick yourself. The proper way to remove a tick is with a tweezers:

- Grab the tick near its head or mouth (the part closest to your skin).
- Gently pull the whole tick straight out. Be careful not to crush or twist the tick.
- Wash your hands and the bite with soap and water.
- Put rubbing alcohol on the bite.

Do not use a hot match to kill and remove a tick.



### Mosquitoes

With the warmer weather emerging comes an increase in mosquito activity. As always, the BOH encourages residents to take precautions to avoid mosquito bites whenever they venture outdoors. There are some common-sense steps we can all take to reduce our chances of mosquito bites:

- Limit your time outdoors during peak periods of mosquito activity (dusk and dawn) or if you must remain outdoors, wear a long-sleeved shirt and long pants. Avoid areas with high mosquito populations such as heavily wooded areas and areas prone to excessive moisture.
- Use a mosquito repellent that contains DEET (the chemical N-N-diethyl-meta-toluamide), permethrin, picaridin (KBR 3023), IR3535 (3-[N-butyl-N-Acetyl]-aminopropionic acid) or oil of lemon eucaplyptus [p-menthane 3, 8-diol (PMD)] according to the instructions on the product label.

Please remember that DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age and should be used in concentrations of 30% or less on older children. Oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under the age of three. Permethrin products are intended for use on items such as clothing, shoes, bed nets and camping gear and should not be applied to skin.

- Take special care to cover up the arms and legs of children playing outdoors. When you bring a baby outdoors, cover the baby's carriage or playpen with mosquito netting.
- Fix holes in your screens and make sure they are tightly attached to all your doors and windows.
- Remove areas of standing water around your home.

Adult mosquito control spraying is offered weekly during peak mosquito season by Norfolk County Mosquito Control. If you would like to request mosquito control or get more information, please visit the District's website at www. norfolkcountymosquito.org.

# Town Fund Provides Tax Relief to the Elderly and Disabled

Every year, Westwood provides tens of thousands of dollars in tax relief to senior citizens and disabled residents through the town's Aid to the Elderly and Disabled Tax Fund. The application process, as well as the distribution of funds, is confidential and any resident who is elderly or disabled is eligible to apply.

The fund was established in 1999 after the state authorized its establishment in what it deemed "growing communities" as a way to help ensure seniors wouldn't be priced out of the homes and communities they love.

The fund is overseen by an appointed committee which confidentially considers all applications from elderly or disabled residents. To qualify, seniors must be age 65 or older, with an annual income of less than the state circuit breaker level of approximately \$62,000, and their Westwood home must be the primary residence. Payments are applied directly to the recipient's tax bill.

In 2016, residents voted to approve a home rule petition, which was subsequently approved by the state. It allows for town funds to be used for this program. This additional funding means more people benefit from the fund and the average amount each receives has increased.

Many town residents include a donation to the fund with their quarterly real estate tax bill payment; the fund also receives various corporate donations. The average residents who receives aid is approximately 80-years-old and has lived in Westwood for 40 to 50 years. Between 45 and 55 residents are assisted annually, each receiving an average amount per household of \$1,800, which amounts to approximately 20-25% of their tax bill. Nearly \$1 million has been distributed since the fund's inception.

At the 2022 Town Meeting on May 2, residents will vote whether to allocate \$300,000 toward the fund. This proposed increase will allow for more participants and will also help offset the new school tax impact on senior residents beginning in fiscal year 2024.

The Westwood Public Safety Communications Center is a 24-hour, 365-day combined police and fire dispatch center that houses the first, first-responder you will encounter when dialing or texting 911, or when calling the non-emergency business line. The Westwood Public Safety Communications Center is the vital link that connects our residents and visitors with public safety services.

Our highly trained 911 telecommunicators are responsible for answering over 5,500 911 calls, and dispatching the over 39,000 emergency and nonemergency calls for service each year to those who are requesting police, fire, emergency medical services, or animal control services. The telecommunicators are also trained to provide Emergency Medical Dispatch pre-arrival instructions to callers in need of medical assistance. These life-saving instructions range from methods to control bleeding to instructing a caller on how to perform CPR until further help arrives. This information updates responders in real time as they travel to the scene to be able to render the best care possible upon arrival.

As the use of technology evolves, so do Westwood's Public Safety Telecommunicators. The team is consistently training to learn the latest advances in the field to assist those in their time of need. Some of the technological advances include 911 misdials from cellular-based devices, 911 activations from accessory devices such as smart watches, and reports of motor vehicle accidents from automated crash detection systems. With minimal information – just a phone number or location – the Public Safety Telecommunicators use their training and experience to quickly evaluate the situation and initiate the appropriate response.

Westwood is fortunate to have its own state-of-the-art Communications Center housed in the heart of the town center. Our telecommunicators know the town they serve. Many grew up in Westwood. 

### Antarctica - Travels at the End of the World






### Islington Branch
